People in the News

Margaret Croston B.E.M

Congratulations to Margaret who was awarded the British Empire Medal in the recent New Year's Honours List, to commemorate her 50years of outstanding service to the community of Christleton and nearby Chester. She was a Parish Councillor for 30years and its first Lady Chairman. She was a Governor at the Primary School for

25years and has been Secretary of the John Sellers Charity for even longer. She was Chairman and Committee Member of the Chester Guide Dogs for the Blind for 27years, is currently a Guide at Chester Cathedral, and Speakers Secretary of the Chester Society for Natural Science, Art and Literature. She has also been an active member of the Chester Ladies Luncheon Club, Chester Ladies Circle and Chester Tangent.

Margaret is a member of the Committee, and a regular competitor



at the Christleton Village Show. She compiled the original Christleton Cook Book, drawing on her own expertise in cooking, to add to recipes she persuaded many of her friends to contribute.

She was also involved in the rewrite which became the Christleton Millennium Cook Book, and has been researcher and writer for the 1977 book about Christleton, and for "Christleton 2000yrs of History" produced by Local History Group.

In addition to all these roles Margaret has been a regular worshipper at St James', secretary of the Christ-

leton PCC for many years, and has organised many fund raising activities & fairs for the church and the local community.

Margaret is the local correspondent of the Chester Chronicle, and has accumulated one of the finest collections of printed resources about our Village. These albums contain stories and pictures about Christleton and its residents that forms a fascinating account of village life over 40years, and is in my view unique. She also contributes regular articles to this Parish Magazine.

In addition to all these voluntary activities, Margaret has been Secretary to the Treasurer of Cheshire County Council, Secretary to the Dean of Law at Manchester University and secretary to Croston Engineering, the successful Milling Fabrication Business run by the family.

Despite all the above she also oversees the activities of husband Alf, and is supported by a strong loving extended family, to whom she is a very special mum, grandma and great grandma. Congratulations Margaret, from the whole community on your well deserved award and we look forward to hearing about your special day at the Palace. DC

Christleton Local History Group

Meeting at Christleton Primary School 7.30pm Wednesday February 26th Speaker David Cummings

The Land of the Long White Cloud - New Zealand

A photographic journey through both north & south islands of New Zealand, looking at the history, wildlife & landscape of this beautiful but remote country. I also examine the effects of recent volcanic activity, including pictures from the city of Christchurch, badly devastated by recent major earthquakes.

Church Stones cont

The Decorated & Perpendicular era I first became familiar with church buildings of this period whilst living in Gloucestershire in the 1960s. The fine Cotswold Churches such as those at Winchcombe, Northleach, Chipping Campden, Fairford and Stow on the Wold were built at a time of great prosperity for the English wool industry.

Wool Merchants almost outdid each other in their desire to provide magnificent buildings for their towns and villages. Some were replacements or additions for buildings dating back to the Saxon & Norman periods. Almost all of these buildings are built using the beautiful mellow oolitic limestone, the



rock that forms the Cotswold Hills.

This stone is easily cut and shaped as I discovered whilst studying for my College dissertation at Farmington Quarry near Northleach. This enables stone masons to carve intricate gargoyles, pinnacles and porches that adorn the buildings. Each has strong sturdy towers, wide naves and aisles, with beautifully shaped windows and castellated roofs. In many cases the churches have large brasses set into the floors that commemorate their benevolent merchants and their family.

My research shows that many of the masons responsible

for these buildings, based at Gloucester Cathedral travelled throughout the country and even influenced the designs of churches in Cheshire. Common mason marks can be traced throughout the region.

Cheshire saw a great explosion of building in this same

period. The Churches at Christleton, Waverton, Bruera, Handley, Bunbury, Acton, Marbury and Audlem are all from this era, between 1350-1500, and as in the Cotswolds many of these churches were remodelled on earlier buildings.

The wealth in Cheshire came mainly from the Gentry, who used the refurbishment and repair of the churches as a means of displaying



their wealth and status. At St James' Christleton the new stone building* of 1470 seems to have been influenced by the wealth of the Brereton, Cholmondeley and Townsend Families. Each had their own chapels within the main church building, and in the case of the Townsends a burial vault under the church.

The Brereton and Cholmondeley Families can also be seen at Malpas Church, which is an excellent example of a building of this period, together with decorated porch, pinnacles and several stone carvings displayed around the exterior of the building. DC

Nature Notes

Although December was a relatively quiet month for wildlife, the regular appearance of a kingfisher on the canal was a great bonus. When spotted it was usually on a low branch on the village side of the canal near Quarry Bridge. It would often move a short distance to another perch as

people approached, but the flash of its iridescent bluegreen plumage as it moved was just brilliant to see.

On one occasion it posed in the sun for us for several seconds turning this way and that, giving superb views of its russet/orange-red underwing colours, before giving a very loud piping call (chee kee) as it dived through the



foliage, under the great willow tree and fast and low along the canal towards the Cheshire Cat. If you don't spot it on this section, check out trees alongside Christleton Lock, or on the section between The Ring Road Bridge and Boughton Hall Cricket Ground.

Another long billed bird that has been seen regularly along the canal is the tall grey heron. They can be over 3ft (1m) tall and have striking black crests on their heads with a large dagger like yellow bill. Their main plumage is grey with large black flight feathers. The males are in their finest plumage at present and can be seen feeding up, as they will soon be attentive at nest sites as the females begin nest sitting earlier than most other birds, in late January/February. Although relatively rare winter visitors such as blackcaps and redpolls are beginning to appear in gardens in the village, I was pleased to see a pair of tiny goldcrests earlier today. Other very rare visitors to appear have been pairs of shoveller and common shelducks.

No doubt the stormy conditions in the estuary and around the coast have sent them to shelter inland, but it was delightful to see them on the marsh. Snipe have also been recorded regularly on my weekly walks, which is a welcome return, and again probably due to the flooded conditions along the Gowy and Mersey Marshes. DC

On Tranquility

Holiday, as the then Rector reminded us in last month's magazine, are a wonderful opportunity to slow down and to recapture something of the peace of the 'holy day'. True, the rush to find the last bucket and spade to squeeze into the bulging car boot, or the queue in the sweltering heat of the autobahn, may seem a long way from idyllic tranquility. But getting away from it all is something we all value and need.

Often those of us who talk most or always seem the busiest are those who discovered early how very much stillness and quietness mean to our lives. Make a quiet place wherein you may learn more of the meaning of prayer and the gladness of communication with God the father"

And isn't that word 'gladness' so significant? Silence, whether between prayers in a church service or while sharing a beautiful view with a close friend, is a joyful and electric experience. It is not a dull nothing, it goes deep. Teach us, Lord, the value of stillness and of peace, a calmness of soul, and the personal tranquility to draw strength from those quietnesses that bring true communion, both with you and with those around us.

Apologies

Cover Picture description for January

When the magazine was being compiled it was intended to use a picture of Quarry Lane in the snow in 1981 as the cover. Unfortunately it was discovered at the last minute that due to the production quality, the original image couldn't be used. A modern digital view of the canal near Rowton Bridge was chosen as a substitute, but the original text wasn't changed.

Just one more piece!

Along with cross-stitch, I am a jigsaw puzzle fan. I can get totally absorbed in them. I usually have to limit myself to 'just ten pieces then you must go and do' whatever task from which I have allowed myself to be side-tracked. Looking at the puzzle, I find myself saying 'it will be easy to find that piece'. I search diligently through the box and through the trays on which I lay out groups of pieces of a similar colour or picture. But I fail to see the piece I want, even though it should be obvious. Reluctantly I go and do what I should have been doing, and then, when I return later, the piece I was looking, so illusive before, seems to leap out at me!

Sometimes the Bible is like a jigsaw puzzle. I can read a Gospel story like the cherished ones from Christmas and because it is familiar I get lost in the familiarity and fail to see the whole picture. That is when I need to stop and to let God move the pieces into place for me.

I well remember the time when I was leading a Communion service and had begun on the Collect for Purity, so familiar I wasn't really concentrating on it ... "Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit ... then suddenly the word 'inspiration' seemed to leap off the page and its meaning as the breathe of God flooded through me. I think before I had seen inspiration as the example or help of the Holy Spirit not His breath being part of my breath. It changed the whole Collect for me.

God is good at doing that. He lets us go on for a bit, then often when we least expect it, he reveals more of his truth to us. Another bit of the puzzle falls into place. There are

often times when God doesn't want us to puzzle over his word but just to let it become part of us. So resting in his word is resting in Him. A jigsaw puzzle can be finished and I can admire the picture but we wont see the whole picture about God until we meet with Him.

As St Paul says in I Corinthians 13.verse 12 (and I have had to use the King James version because the words are so beautiful) "For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then I shall know even as I am known"

Apparently, Corinth was famous for the manufacture of mirrors, which in those days were polished metal so the images reflected were indistinct in comparison to our modern mirrors. The images were seen 'darkly' which from the original Greek means as in a riddle or an enigma. Not clear, in other words, difficult to see, like the puzzle piece.

We can only know God in our limited human ways but God knows all of us. He has given us the promise that one day we shall see him face to face; then all the pieces of the puzzle will fall into place. Until that time we have to allow God to work through the pieces we do have, share the pieces with others and to help others see the pieces they have so more of God's loving purpose for us is revealed. In love and light.
