The Rector's Letter

Dear Friends

Church Membership

Last month I invited us all to use Lent as a 'Health Check' to examine our lives to ensure they are in balance and in harmony with God's purposes. Jesus used his time in the wilderness to prepare for his ministry and to ensure he was 'fit for purpose'. After his Baptism Jesus called his disciples to be his Church to help his ministry and mission in the world. So in Lent we remember how still today Jesus calls us to be his Church for the purpose of extending God's Kingdom on earth as in Heaven. That is why we belong to the Church.

It so happens that we have been told that we need to compile a completely new Electoral Roll this year. Everyone has to reapply in order to be on the Roll, and application forms need to be in by 10 March (see note elsewhere in magazine). The Electoral Roll is a working document of the Parish Church. It is the equivalent of the civil Register of Electors; it enables those included to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, and to stand for election to the Parochial Church Council. It is also used for other purposes such as to assess Parish representation to the Deanery and Diocese etc. Every worshipping member of St James over 16 should join the Electoral Roll, but people who live outside the Ecclesiastical Parish of Christleton must have been a regular worshipper at St James for the six months leading up to application. Membership of the Electoral Roll enables those living outside the Parish to be married at St James. Also right of Burial in the Churchyard can only be granted to those who live outside the Parish, if they are on the Electoral Roll. As we apply for membership of the Electoral Roll it is a good time to ask ourselves what our Church membership means to us in real and practical terms. Are we 'fit for purpose' according to the priorities and tasks Jesus entrusted to his Church? So again Lent can be used as an opportunity to make our discipleship more effective.

This year the PCC has decided to hold the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on Sunday 28 March following a short service in Church at 10.45 am. This is to encourage and enable as many Church members as possible to take part in the meeting and actively engage in what we are doing as a Church.

Following the meeting, which will be kept as brief as possible, there will be a Buffet 'Faith' Lunch in the Parish Hall where there will be displays and presentations of what we are doing as a Church. Do please come and join in so more and more of us can feel actively involved in our ministry and mission. There will be opportunity to share and suggest ideas as to how we could be more effective. The meeting will include the election of 2 Churchwardens and 5 members to the Parochial Church Council for a 3 year term of office. Lois Dickinson has indicated she will stand again for election as Churchwarden for one more year, but David Mercer will not be standing for election, so we need someone to take over. As we thank David for all he has done as Churchwarden we are glad he will continue as Treasurer and to manage the Parish Hall. He will also continue to be involved in the work of the Stewardship Committee in carrying out the necessary work resulting from the Architect's Quinquennial Inspection of the Church last year, which thankfully was nowhere near as extensive or expensive as last time!

I do hope all of us will use these opportunities to help us as a Church to be increasingly effective in our membership and in the ministry and mission to which Jesus calls us as his disciples in this Parish.

The “Reg Morgan” cover picture this month features the Pump House standing on the cobbled area opposite the house then known as “Holly Bank”. The pump house is gated, and is overlooked by both gas lamp, and a signpost to the Whitchurch Road. Holly Bank (now Birch Heath Lodge) was originally built as a private school for Benjamin & Ephraim Parkin. The first headteacher was a Thomas Lakeland, and we learn of the lessons taught there in 1817 from a letter written by young Thomas Welsby to his father, a wine merchant in Chester. They included Greek and Latin! It later became a private house and was occupied at one time by Rector Lionel Garnett’s sister Annie, who married into the Rolt Family. Their son L T C Rolt is the canal enthusiast and writer, who did so much to promote the use of canals for leisure.

The date of the photograph is believed to be 1907. DC

THE HISTORY FILE

Celia Fiennes believed by many to be “The Lady on the White Horse from Banbury Cross” was one of the first travellers to write about her journeys through the English countryside. After one of her many visits to Chester, she describes in her journal her route across the “Roman Bridges” at Hockenhull.

“I went 3 miles on a causey through much wood; its from Nantwich to Chester Town 14 long miles the wayes being deep; its much on enclosures and I passed by several large pools of waters but what I wondered at was that tho this shire is remarkable for a great deale of greate Cheeses and Dairyes, I did not see more than 20 or 30 coves in a troope feeding, but on enquirey find the custome of the country is to joyn their milking together of a whole village, and so make their greate cheeses, and so it goes round.”

She later writes about her arrival in Chester and gives a fascinating account of the City in 1685. After visiting the Old Port, where the quaysides and warehouses stood on the land between the present County

Hall and the River she writes, “The traditional industries such as ship building, leather working and snuff manufacturing are now in decline, to be replaced by lead works, and hydraulic engineering



works, but it is also catering for the leisured gentry and upper classes, who gravitated to the city, and used it as a base to travel to Ireland and to and from London. She continues that “the town is mostly timber framed buildings, the main trade is to Ireland and to Wales, but it is broad below the town, where they have a little dock, and build ships of 200tun. I saw some on the stocks.

Celia Fiennes is commemorated in the Millennium window at St James’, and at No Mans Heath near Malpas, members of the local History Group there have erected a fine white marble statue to Celia and her famous steed Equis. The site can be visited just a short distance off the new A41, about two miles on from the Hampton Heath roundabout, by taking the signpost to No Mans Heath and Malpas. As you approach No Mans Heath, turn left onto the old A41 and the statue is almost immediately on your right on a small green area before the houses.

Poop! Poop! Watch out for Mr Toad!

Big rubber tyres squash small squidgy amphibians. It is a sad fact of life that thousands of common toads, known as *Bufo bufo*, are going to face death on our roads in the next few weeks.

The reason is because toads like to breed in certain places, and for some reason, they are almost always on the wrong side of the road when mating season begins. The poor toad can’t win. For centuries seen as something evil, now they simply aren’t seen fast enough.... not on roads in the dark and the rain - which is when they most like to cross them.

Toads may not be beautiful, but they have had their fans. George Orwell wrote of them: “A toad has about the most beautiful eye of any living creature. It is like gold, or more exactly it is like the gold-coloured semi-precious stone which one sometimes sees in signet rings.” Watching as one toad emerged from its mud-encased winter sleep, Orwell also observed: “... after his long fast the toad has a very spiritual look, like a strict Anglo-Catholic towards the end of Lent.”

CATHEDRAL NEWS

The Cathedral Shop sells wooden Chester Crosses made by Tim Brodbelt, a member of the congregation. They are mostly made from Spanish Olive wood but occasionally made from a South African wood called Pink Ivory. A visitor from California bought one last summer and it is now behind

the halo of a St Mary shrine in an Episcopal church in California.

ST WERBURGH

This year sees the eleven hundredth anniversary of the Translation of the Relics of St Werburgh to Chester. She was a Saxon princess who became a nun. Her shrine is in the Lady Chapel. The anniversary will be marked in a number of ways including a Pilgrimage from Hanbury Church on 17 June and finishing in Chester with Evensong at the Cathedral on Thursday 21 June which is St Werburgh's Day. The midsummer Watch Parade will concentrate on St Werburgh and there will be a re-enactment of a Viking village the previous weekend.

SAINTS' WINDOWS IN THE CLOISTERS

Mathias the Apostle was chosen to replace Judas Iscariot as he could bear witness to the Resurrection of Jesus. He preached the Gospel for more than 30 years in Judea, Cappadocia, Egypt and Ethiopia. He is remembered for preaching the need for mortification of the flesh with regard to all its sensual and irregular desires.

Mad as a March Hare?

Mad or not, this is the best time of year to see any sort of hare. But you'll have to be quick: the brown hare is Britain's fastest mammal, reaching staggering speeds of 35 to 45 mph over open ground. With their orange brown fur, powerful hind legs and black tipped ears, hares are magnificent and a pleasure to watch as they run.

If you are very fortunate, you may even see two hares 'box' this month, during their breeding season. One will almost certainly be an unimpressed female, telling an over-ambitious male to get lost.

Sadly, hares in Britain are in serious decline. In the late 19th century, there were probably more than four million. Today, barely a fifth of this number remains. Their decline is due to modern intensive agriculture methods, however, not aggressive females!



Nature Notes



The highlights this month include the sighting of a large flock of yellowhammers, in fields near the Sports Club. Yellowhammers are now quite rare in Cheshire, and this was an excellent sighting. Their display call “a little bit of bread and no cheese” is very distinctive, and was once heard everywhere in the village. Another

excellent sighting was a barn owl hunting near Littleton, whilst a tawny owl was heard calling near The Pit. Large flocks of field fare and redwing are also foraging on the fields. The Tuesday walking group were delighted to hear at least four greater spotted woodpeckers drumming, on their recent walk around the parish, and a newly excavated nest site has been spotted at Birch Heath. Buzzards, kestrels and sparrowhawks have been much in evidence, and yet another red kite reported.



Three different pairs of swans have disputed territory at The Pit, with our own pair eventually winning out on the 5th February. However they had no sooner flown in and claimed their nest site, than they started to chase off last years 5 remaining cygnets. I had the task of trying to get them to safety, not an easy task, and I hoped that they could escape without too much damage from a very vicious and angry cob. What must they have thought, to suddenly find their once caring adults chasing and

pecking at them, who only a day or so before, had shown them great affection. One of the pairs chased off was a pair that had tried to nest on the Waverton Canal last spring, before being set upon by our Christleton pair when they moved from the Pit onto the canal. I had later rescued that cob CJ03 from a field of maize at Rowton, and released it for safety on the Pit, as it would have been attacked again if it had been put back onto the canal. However it now has a new mate and having lost the battle at The Pit, has come back to the former territory on the canal at Rowton. What a carry on, just like one big swan merry go round!
