st. james' THE RECTORS LETTER

Dear Friends

In Good Order

This will not quite be my last 'Rector's letter' but it is good to note that before I go some important improvements will be completed in the Church and Churchyard. It is wonderful, at last, to see our beautiful stained glass windows at St James protected with polycarbonate 'shields'. It has been a long, hard battle to convince the 'authorities' to allow us to use this method of protecting the windows rather than metal grills. I do not want to go into all those arguments here, but suffice it to say that we are convinced that this method, which allows the light through without imposing the pattern of the grills on the windows, and also offers better protection, is the right one for St James. We are very grateful for an extremely generous donation which paid for all this work at a cost of around £10,000. This means that the money still in the Restoration Appeal Fund, which was 'earmarked' for this work, can now be used for other important and necessary work, for example in restoring and repointing parts of the boundary wall. This Summer St James is again open every Sunday between morning and evening services, with the Village Teas at the Methodist Church from 2.30 pm - 4.30 pm. If you have never had the chance to look properly at the stained glass this is a good time to do it! Many of those who have kindly volunteered in pairs to take 2 hour 'slots' looking after St James while it is open on Sundays have themselves found this a good opportunity to look round at leisure and appreciate the different aspects of the building. Much of the stained glass is by the renowned Victorian artist Kempe with his 'signature' of the wheatsheaf. So why not visit or 'sign up' for a 2 hour 'slot' on the Rota and take the chance find out more about the Church and help to keep St James open through the Summer?

Another improvement planned for the near future is to improve the Cremated remains area in front of Church. You will find details of this work elsewhere in the magazine so please read about it, especially if you have family members remembered there. I am sure that the work will greatly improve the look of the whole area and help to keep it as a fitting memorial.

The PCC is very grateful to all those families who have now had gravestones reinstated with the correct safety features following the safety inspection last year. We very much regret any distress that the process caused, but hope that people appreciate that we are obliged to ensure safety. More gravestones are now being reinstated and efforts being made to contact the families so that the churchyard can be restored as it should be. This will also be helped by work being done this month to repair and level the paths which had deteriorated, but we apologise for any inconvenience while the work is being done.

New signage for the Car Park will complete the work already done on the Car Park, Notice Boards, outside lighting and Church porch enhancing the approach to Church. Overall this represents a great improvement to the Church and its surroundings. Our thanks are due to all those who have helped to make all this possible but especially to Keith Smalls who has overseen much of the work and given so much time and patience and David Mercer who has worked so hard and given his time and talent in getting the work done.

Historic Churches Preservation Trust Ride and Stride! September 11th 2010

I write this sitting in our own historic church of St James, not during the sermon but while "church sitting" for, as it were, English Heritage.

Last year, Edward Elliot, who has done this cycle solo for some years, was joined

in the effort by myself, and my trusty one "dog power", Kelty, our border collie.

I had also pressganged a friend, Sue, into accompanying me on the circuit.

We so much enjoyed last year's cycle, and had a wonderful welcome (with extra biscuits for Kelty!) at the churches that were open. Starting off in Vicars Cross (my home patch), we went down Green Lane, incorporating Vicars Cross URC, along the canal towpath to St Pauls, Boughton, out to Huntington to St Lukes, and though Caldy Valley nature park to Caldy Valley Church and neighbourhood centre. The Partington Oak

embers of the Parish Council decided some time ago to celebrate the almost 90 years service of Mary and Jim Partington (mother & son) to the Parish Council & Village, by the planting an oak tree on the



Village Green adjacent to their former Family Butchers Shop. The oak tree was planted last year but on Sunday 16th June 2010 a distinctive commemorative plaque paid for by public subscription, was unveiled by Lucy Partington, surrounded by many of her close family and friends. The ceremony was conducted by Graham



Ranger on behalf of the Parish Council, who made a very appropriate speech about the long and valued service the Partingtons have given to the Village.

Mary was the daughter of Joe Mosford the local butcher and slaughterman, but she soon made her own mark on the village gaining the title of "Mrs Christleton", by helping to found the Women's

Institute, organising the Village Fete, being an energetic committee member of Christleton Players and the Badminton Club. In her lifetime she was also Chairman of the Parish Council and British Legion, and was actively involved in the life of St James' Church. Mary was clearly a formidable lady, and it was in her later years, and through her enthusiasm for the village, that Christleton entered and won the Best Kept Village Competition organised by Cheshire Community Council. So it is appropriate therefore that the Partington Oak stands adjacent to the Best Kept Village Sign, a competition which Jim also did so much to support.

Jim who was known as "Mr Christleton", gave equal commitment to the village during his lifetime. Although he would have preferred to have been a farmer, he and his devoted

wife Lucy took over the family butchering business from Joe & Mary Mosford. For so many years it was the centre of village life, where everyone shopped, exchanged views (gossip!) and found Jim to be the most caring and helpful of people. He knew everyone, and through this knowledge, continued his mother's great role in the village by serving on the Parish Council for over 40 years. He was particularly involved in the "Best Kept Village Competition" and was always keen to see the village do well, even watering the plants on the Village Green or Pump House himself. He was also responsible for erecting the Christmas trees on The Green and in Church. He was Parish Council Chairman several times, and his knowledge of the village and its needs was always paramount in his thoughts. He was always keen to develop play facilities for children and sporting facilities for the village, especially for football and cricket. He was one of the many devoted volunteers who revived the fortunes of Christleton Sports Club, and helped provide the wonderful facilities they now have at Little Heath. Jim went on to become President of the Cricket Club. He was also heavily involved in the workings of the Christleton Institute, being a prime mover behind the club, and an institution there himself as "Bingo Caller" for over fifty years. He was a keen churchman and supported the work and worship at St James' during his lifetime in the village. The Partington Oak on the Green is a very appropriate tribute to Mary, Jim and their family whose wonderful life time of service to this village will live on through this fine young oak tree.

Cremated Remains Area

he PCC plans to refurbish the old cremated remains area at the front of church this summer. Our aim is to create an attractive, tranquil place of rest, appropriate for purpose and a pleasant place for families to come and pay their respect to loved ones. Over time the cremated remains area has become a bit dishevelled and has suffered some subsidence and families, understandably have attempted to improve the area around their particular stone. By its nature this uncoordinated action has tended to add to the problem. The work we plan to undertake will address all these issues.

The work will take a few weeks to complete and we will do our utmost to minimise disruption. However the work will entail temporarily removing the stones, before carefully replacing them to their original place. We therefore wish to give notice to families with ashes buried in this area of the work being undertaken so not to cause any upset or distress if visiting the church yard during the work. We will also be posting notices in church and on the notice board to keep people informed. We would

also suggest not to leave flowers etc on the stones immediately before or during the work as they will have to be moved to allow the work to be undertaken. We will give advance notice of the precise start date as soon as it is known.

The work is being paid for, partly by a kind donation from G. Pettit & Son and the balance by the PCC. If however family or friends wish to make a contribution to the cost of the work this would be gratefully welcomed.

The swans walk again!!

t seven days old the six newly born cygnets were force marched through the village once again by the old cob

pen. date all is well, and the Christleton pair & six, are keeping to the Christleton end of the canal, whilst the Waverton pair & six, three weeks older are keeping to their territory between Rowton Bridge & Davies Bridge beyond Waverton. Long may they stay like that, because if they clash, I fear there will be major problems for the older Christleton cob, as the younger Waverton cob is extremely aggressive to other water birds and humans using the canal towpath. We have posted



some excellent close ups of the Christleton Pit pair & cygnets on the Christleton website, as they enabled me to stay very close in their first few hours to get some extremely close-up views. I'm grateful to the Rector & his wife Fiona who were alerted to their walk very early one morning, and very kindly collected and guided them from the centre of the village, taking them to safety on the canal through the Stile footpath to the canal at Rowan Park. I began to despair when I checked all my swan nests sites around the Chester area, as numbers are well down on two years ago when 85 cygnets were born. However the latest news at the time of writing (1st June) is that I have now located 4 successful pairs each with six healthy cygnets. I hope that readers will have seen the small flocks of colourful goldfinches that have graced the village in the last few weeks, and also seen the good numbers of

greenfinches, siskins, and all members of the titmouse family that seem to be doing so well. The warblers have continued to sing their hearts out for much longer than usual, and although the spring is later and has been much colder, good numbers of young birds have now been born. A number of people have

reported that they have heard yet more owls calling around the village, and there are clearly good numbers of great spotted woodpeckers about. My favourite birds of the month have been the great crested grebes which I seem to have located on many ponds and lakes over the last few weeks. Seeing these graceful birds displaying their full plumage is just magical, and



although I haven't managed to film their exquisite courtship display I have been lucky to capture great views of the male bird, as pictured here.

Last month the last phrases of nature notes were lost in transfer from one computer to another, but I'm delighted to report that a second water vole has been spotted regularly at "the Pit" in a completely different area from the first, which is very exciting news indeed, as these little creatures have suffered badly in recent years from the illegal release of wild mink into our local waters. Let's hope these sightings are the first of many in the village.

We have only just given to the excellent and worthy Christian Aid and a letter arrives from OXFAM, then one from CAFOD, then breaking news on television shows horrific pictures of an earthquake in Central America or South East Asia. Within days, and quite rightly, the UK Joint Emergencies Committee will be appealing nationwide on behalf of the earthquake victims.

To make matters worse, as businesses themselves many of the national charities are facing their own financial challenges at present; trying to raise yet more funds while laying off some of their own staff. Ironic too that organisations like Crisis and the Salvation Army are struggling fully to help poor families hit by the recession and by unemployment.

These pressures, mostly less serious, can affect all of us; from the schoolchild coming home asking for cash to sponsor someone running a half-marathon, to those of us perhaps in a better position to give. With the rearing of three children behind me, I am one of those. Nor have I any objection to the 4 or 5 major charities I tend to give to circulating me with written requests for donations, generally for particular projects. That is perfectly fair, and whether I am giving that time or not, I try to discipline myself to read at least one 'story' from the brochures enclosed and to take it in.

Christians as much as anyone are aware of what some call compassion fatigue, where a busy and materialistic society loses the will to make time regularly for instance to visit elderly relatives or even to read charity literature. Have we now reached 'charity fatigue' in the United Kingdom? If so, what do we do about it? Answers on a postcard

Charities don't just beg for any old purpose; indeed the word 'beg' has unfortunate connotations. Nor do they only raise funds for disasters or for hunger-ridden regions of the world. Just as Cancer Research UK openly raises money for research, so the Motor Neurone Disease Association has in recent months stressed that so much research into the causes of MND is

still required that, after some debate, that is where its current focus must be.

Many of the larger charities have their origin and historical roots in specific events or situations. Save The Children started just over 90 years ago to help children in destitute families in Germany, our recent enemy in the First World War. The Friends Meeting House at 43 St Giles in Oxford was famous for the founding of the Oxford Committee for Famine Relief (OXFAM) a few years before I worshipped there as a student.

Who to give to? When? How? Difficult decisions, even amongst excellent and deserving causes. But neither God, Jesus, nor our parents or teachers ever promised us that choices in life would be easy. Most of us in the western world have plentiful lives, elsewhere millions do not.

The charitable organisations and those who work for them deserve our prayers and regular help; each in our on way.
