

The Rector's Letter

Dear Friends

Life in the Spirit

It was a very special occasion on 11 May as we celebrated the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost to the first disciples, and witnessed the giving of the Holy Spirit to those of our members who were presented for Confirmation by the Bishop of Birkenhead. Just a week later we celebrated Trinity Sunday as the culmination of the first half of the Christian year, as we step back and worship God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. From Advent we have marked each stage of the story of God's saving love through the birth, life, teaching, death, Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus and then his gift of the Spirit to the Church. The whole of the second half of the Church's year, the Trinity season, focuses on the life of the Church in carrying out the ministry and mission entrusted to his Church by Our Lord, in the power of the Spirit.

Every Christian is called to their own particular discipleship: we each have a part in the life of the Spirit. As we think of those who were Confirmed, I also remember my own Ordination on Trinity Sunday 1969 at Christ Church, Oxford. We are all at different stages of our life in the Spirit. St James was packed recently, with standing room only, for the funeral of Jim Partington. There was a special feeling of being together to recognise, and thank God for his life. I was drawn, in what I said, to words of St Paul from our reading:- "In the Lord, your labour cannot be lost." As I think of people like Jim, Len Thomas, Dorothy Colley McNair and Harold Whetnall, who were so much part of the life of St James and the village, I am aware that they have influenced, and shaped, what we still experience in our shared life: their labour in the Lord cannot be lost. And so we are drawn to realise that life in the Spirit comes to each of us individually, but only in order to be part of something much bigger, for life in the Spirit unites us as God's family.

That is something we know and value as a local Church and community, but it does not stop there. To be a Christian is to belong to a family stretching back in history to that first Pentecost, and out to the ends of the earth. It is a wonderful privilege to belong to the Church, and to be linked, by the Spirit, to the Church universal and the 'Communion of Saints'. "Touch the Church in one place and it trembles in another." How easily we take that for granted, and fail to 'tap in' to the worldwide web of the Spirit. From 16 July to 4 August the Lambeth Conference will be held at Canterbury. This brings together the whole Anglican Communion

throughout the world, to share in the life of the Spirit, and to listen together to what the Spirit is saying to the Church today. Sadly, attention has been focused on the possibility of certain Dioceses and Bishops staying away because they disagree with the practice and doctrine of other members. I remember learning (as an embryonic Theologian!) the distinction in the New Testament between *Kerygma* and *didache*. *Kerygma* is the kernel of the Gospel; that which is essential to the gospel, and that for which you go to the stake! *Didache* is the teaching; that which the Church deduces from the Gospel and accepts as its doctrine. *Didache* is flexible, evolving and important, but not essential. Now unity is *kerygma*: it is essential to the gospel as Christ's prayer that we might be one that the world might believe. I hope and pray that all those invited to the Lambeth Conference will think and pray long and hard before they conclude that their interpretation of doctrine is more important than the unity we share in Christ. We are all asked to pray for the Lambeth Conference and all those invited. May the life they share in the Spirit bring new understanding, unity and strength to the whole Church.

I leave you with that exhortation from St Paul:- "Therefore my beloved friends, stand firm and immovable, and work for the Lord always, work without limit, since you know that in the Lord your labour cannot be lost." (1 Corinthians 15:58)

Harold Whetnall

The death of Harold last month was yet another of the WWII generation from the village who served their country with distinction. Harold served with the Royal Artillery Survey Regiment and landed in Normandy on Sword Beach on D Day+1. He later became 2nd Lieutenant in the South Lancs. Regt., and was demobbed in 1947 with the rank of Captain. These serving men went on to bring much pride to their later work and recreation. In Harold's case dedication to life at St James for over 40years, serving as Sunday school teacher, sidesman and Church Warden. Harold was a man of strength and character, hard working, honest and had great integrity. During his working life he served with distinction with the NHS, then British Enka, and finally as Company Secretary for The Chester Observer. He was a family man devoted to his wife Beryl and daughter Christina. He loved walking in the hills and both playing and watching cricket. He also loved books and music, enjoying listening to Opera and Welsh Male Voice Choirs. He and Len Thomas had so much in common, and it's sad that we lost two such distinguished men from the St James' family in the same month.


The recent death of Jim “Mr Christleton” aged 86 has brought even more sadness to the village.

His commitment to the village was immense, and those new to the village will not know of his enormous contribution over his lifetime. He was

born at Rock House, where the family butchering business (Mosford’s) had been established for many years, which Jim together with Lucy his devoted wife, later took over.

It was for many years the centre of village life, where everyone shopped, exchanged views (gossip!) and found Jim to be the most caring and helpful of people. He knew everyone, and through this knowledge, continued his mother Mary’s (known locally as “Mrs Christleton”) great role in the village by serving for 40 years on the Parish Council. He was particularly involved in the “Best Kept Village Competition” and was always keen to see the village do well, even watering the plants on

the Village Green or Pump House himself. He was also responsible for erecting the Christmas trees on The Green or in Church. He was Parish Council Chairman several times, and his knowledge of the village and



its needs were always paramount in his thoughts. He was always keen to develop play facilities for children, and also through sport, especially football and cricket. He was one of the many devoted volunteers who revived the fortunes of Christleton Sports Club, and helped provide

the wonderful facilities they now have at Little Heath. He was a keen footballer himself and had a trial for Chester City, as well as being a good cricketer, especially behind the stumps. Jim went on to become President of the Cricket Club, but was still competent behind the wheel

from his early days as a farmer at Eccleston where he worked on the family farm, and he loved nothing more in retirement than to be asked to help out by driving a tractor for Dandy's or Arden's Farms.



Jim was also heavily involved in the workings of the Christleton Institute being a prime mover behind the club, and an institution there himself as “Bingo Caller” for over fifty years. He was a keen churchman and supported the work and worship at St James’ during his lifetime in the village. He was also a devoted family man to his wife Lucy, daughter Kathleen, his late son Kenneth, and their families including five grandchildren and six great grandchildren. However it’s his lifetime commitment to Christleton that we will remember, and a number of lasting tributes are being planned to honour his memory.

NATURE NOTES

I have enjoyed a wonderful month looking at the natural world, with almost all migrant birds arriving on time, especially the swifts which were right on the due date for Christleton 7th May, although there seem fewer numbers than usual, and I've yet to hear a cuckoo anywhere I've travelled.

The highlight locally has been the number of butterflies, especially along the canal, with good numbers of holly blue, orange tip, speckled wood, peacock, red admiral, tortoiseshell and even three beautiful yellow brimstones. It is also difficult to believe that we have fifteen or so of the magnificent black and white wading birds, the avocet (symbols of the RSPB) on view in the area, however there

are, with the bonus of one or possibly two nest sites on scrapes on a local reserve. I also viewed good numbers of rare crossbills and siskin last month in the hills near Llangollen, together with a magnificent peregrine falcon which flew just over the top of the car whilst driving through the Eglwyseg Valley. However I had an even closer experience of a pair of peregrines who were calling and displaying to each

other, oblivious of the fact that I was standing about twenty feet away on a cliff top on the remote Pembrokeshire Island of Ramsey. It was also good to see about ten pairs of chough along the coastline, This rare member of the crow family, is making a come back all over the UK, causing great



excitement, particularly in Cornwall where it is the county emblem, and both north and south Wales. The chough is a charismatic bird, with glossy blue - black plumage, and bright red feet and curved red bill. It is slightly larger than a jackdaw, with fingered wingtips and squarer tail. It is a graceful flier with a distinctive and loud musical call. "Chee-oww or chow, and sometimes a harsher kee'argh".

It was also very pleasing to find many specimens of green winged orchids along the cliff tops, together with the more expected early purple orchids. I have only previously seen the green winged orchids on the Greek Islands, so it was a very pleasant surprise to see them in Pembrokeshire, and so early in the year. The close cropped grass of the limestone cliff tops is grazed by both sheep and wild ponies, and is



clearly proving an excellent habitat for both chough and orchids. On Ramsey red deer are also used by the RSPB for this task, and the close sward that they produce is also proving excellent for breeding pairs of lapwing. The fact that there is no disturbance from farm machinery, predators such as fox and other vermin, and only the occasional human visitor, makes it a very safe place to breed.

ON Being Paid

I was not made personally conscious of the feeling of being paid for labour, deeds and duties until at 18 I earned £4.12.8d for a week's Christmas work at Wigton Post Office. True, I know that even in the 1950's many adults in Cumberland as elsewhere coped with low wages and modest standards of living. As for news of high finance and the world's money markets, they rarely featured on our crackly radio. Most people lived within their means and were content.

In Cumberland the strictly amateur rugby union was the dominant male sport both in schools and in clubs. Amateur sport was what it said; participants received no cash for playing. As for rugby league, there were only two quite new professional sides in the area, and the amateur version of that 13-a-side game flourished with quite a few schoolboys playing it. But even there it was a taboo to talk about money and only the occasional gossip emerged that a lad had been slipped a ten shilling note for his bus fare!

When I was 15 I plucked up courage

to ask my father if he would mind me going to watch Workington Town, a new side already playing the likes of Wigan in the professional game. Rather reluctantly he agreed, adding that he did not really approve of people playing sport for money. Luckily most of the Workington team were still local men, supplemented by one Australian, two Lancastrians, and the legendary Welshman Gus Risman as player-manager.

For my family, Gus made my Saturday afternoons on the terraces fairly respectable. As a professional with Salford before the war, he and other rugby league players were allowed to play alongside amateur rugby union players in the Services in occupied Germany, one of whom was my father's youngest brother. I believe that they played against each other in an unofficial England v Wales international somewhere near Düsseldorf!

Yet in 1945 all that changed. The Armistice may have ended a devastating war, but the minute it was over professional and amateur rugby players were no longer allowed to play together, or even to socialise without arousing suspicion. It took until the 1990's for the amateur rugby union to become "professional". That might have been frowned upon

by some, but at least it returned to the 1939-45 situation which had allowed harmony and respite for serving officers.

We can argue that there is too much money in sport today, we can pray in Church for a sense of proportion in finance and money and for wider sharing of the world's riches. But at least in the game of rugby a rigid and unpleasant apartheid has been and gone.


CATHEDRAL NEWS SAINTS' WINDOWS IN THE CLOISTERS

St Augustine of Canterbury was a Monk and Abbot of Saint Andrew's Abbey in Rome. Sent by Pope Gregory the Great with 40 brother monks, including Saint Lawrence of Canterbury, to evangelize the British Isles in 597. Before he reached the islands, terrifying tales of the Celts sent him back to Rome in fear, but Gregory told him he had no choice and so he went. He established and spread the faith throughout England; one of his earliest converts was King Ethelbert who brought 10,000 of his people in the Church. Ordained a bishop in Gaul (modern France) by the Archbishop of Arles. Augustine was the first Archbishop of Canterbury. He helped re-establish contact between the Celtic and Latin churches, though he could not establish his desired uniformity of liturgy and practices between them. Worked referred to as occupying the Chair of Augustine.

Born: Rome, Italy

Died: 26 May 605 in Canterbury, England of natural causes: relics interred outside the church of Saints Peter and Paul, Canterbury, a building project he had started.

I will miss his infectious smile and wit and our conversations about wildlife, the land, farming and sport. RUSSIA AT THE RA AND A SHORT VISIT TO YORK

Because of a dispute one of the world's most important collections of modern French paintings nearly didn't arrive in London. A Moscow textile magnate, Sergei Shchukin, with his friend Ivan Morosov, spent the early years of the 20th century collecting modern art in Paris. Both were dismissed at the time as ignorant. In the post war years in Russia it took nerve to curate these paintings and as late as 1962 the staff of the Hermitage were officially warned to take down their Matisse's and Picassos. However the Royal Academy exhibition celebrated not only the paintings themselves but all those who protected and preserved them through a turbulent century. The outstanding paintings were The Red Room and The Dance both by

Henri Matisse, Women on the sea Shore by Paul Gauguin, Picasso's Dryad, The Girl at the Piano by Paul Cezanne and photographs showing how these masterpieces were originally displayed in the Russian Museums – the Hermitage, State Russian, Pushkin and Trtyakov.

The queues were long and the exhibition so popular that the RA was going to stay open until midnight during the week that it finished.

YORK was very cold and windy but we managed to fit in a visit to Castle Howard where the flag was flying at half mast as one of the male family members had died the previous Thursday. The line which almost was wiped out through executions



and imprisonments in the Tower of London continues with twins and Castle Howard remains the family home.

In the city itself we were welcomed to the church of St Michael le Belfrey. The “le Belfrey” either refers to the next door Minster belfry or to an older church on this site. This is a parish church serving the local community and was rebuilt between 1525 and 1537 during King Henry VIII’s break with Rome. There are boards bearing the names of York Lord Mayors who lived within the parish and information about Guy Fawkes who was baptised there in 1570. The lectern was made by Thompsons of Kilburn with their trademark mouse on its plinth.

The Fifth Sunday of Easter saw us at the sung Eucharist at York Minster with the Dean of Durham preaching. Singing was led by the men’s choir and the girls’ choir (nineteen in all) some of them seemed to be mere toddlers. They sang Gabriel Faurés tantum ergo. The boys’ choir were to sing with the men at Evensong. There are currently places available in the Minster Choir for boys. Everyone was welcome to coffee in the Chapter House after the service, when we emerged outside to rain.

Some were thrilled – some were very disappointed – no-one became a millionaire overnight – but some had objects which interested the experts and merited a special appearance in front of the cameras to talk about the piece they had brought. Towards 6 pm things started to wind down and only a few people waited, still patiently, in the short lines by the experts' tables. Soon the consultations were over and the BBC team set about the task of stripping down the lights, the platforms and screen and packing away the cameras.

It had been a very long day for staff and visitors alike. However – it was a very enjoyable occasion and there was a wonderful 'buzz' about the place throughout the day. It was fascinating to see how the programme was made and we will all watch, with interest, in the autumn, when the programme goes on the air, to see if we 'starred'!
