Message from our Rector

The past few weeks have seemed like one long party, the highlight of which was without doubt the jubilee parties, celebrating the diamond jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth.

What had stated as typical bank holiday weather (cold and wet) certainly improved on Bank holiday Monday as the street party in Christleton got into full swing.

It was a joy to see so many people gathered together in the glorious sunshine, neighbours, friends, perhaps even strangers, but all coming together to share, to laugh and to celebrate.

As I wandered round, enjoying the company of so many people, being offered food and drink. It was good to be part of a community, where each member of the community worked for and considered the needs of each other. Throughout the afternoon, I was constantly reminded of the passage from the second chapter of the Book of the Acts of the Apostles;

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe, and the apostles did many wonders and miraculous signs. All the believers were together and had everything in common. Selling their possessions and goods, they gave to anyone, as he had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people.

And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved".

Sometimes it can be difficult for us to fully engage with Holy Scripture, we are after all, geographically and historically so far removed from those first believers and yet through the experiences of the events such as the Christleton jubilee street party, we can look in, rather like looking through a window, into the life of the early church and experience the sense of community which they lived, the sharing with and caring for each other, with young and old mixing together in a true sense of community and fellowship.

My prayer is that the outpouring of fun and fellowship which we were privileged to experience and enjoy over the past few weeks may lead us into a deeper awareness of the value and strength of community and that we may all be blessed though our experiences.

Nature Notes.

Swans & Cygnets. Kites & Hedgehogs.

The saga of our swans continues. Following their dramatic capture, from just off the A41 and their safe release onto the canal, reported as late news in the last edition, their adventures have continued. For over a week I had reports of all four surviving cygnets being seen on either the cob or pen's backs.

Sometimes they would be

split in different configurations, but something was amiss, and I have only seen cygnets hiding on the adults backs on a handful of occasions, but never for such a prolonged period. My theory now is that as the air temperature had dropped dramatically from the



time they were born they were very cold, and were huddling behind their parent's wings for warmth. They seemed to be growing well and looked secure but earlier in the week I found one cygnet missing, and so there were three left from the initial

seven eggs. Why had the cygnet disappeared! Well I think I found the answer about 400yards from where I had last seen them. On the canal bank near Rowton a fisherman had caught a huge pike and was taking the hook out of its mouth to release it back into



the canal. One of the main predators of cygnets are pike who are known to take even quite large cygnets. I have never seen a pike on the canal, but there is a distinct possibility that this was the culprit. Since this incident the swans have appeared feeding on people's gardens, and less on the water. I just hope the other three cygnets manage to survive.



I've had four reports in the last three weeks of a red kite being seen in the skies over Christleton, three have been from the Plough Lane area, so it's just possible that there is a kite roosting out somewhere close, perhaps looking for a territory, or just resting in a new area. They are really dramatic birds with a distinctive red v shaped tail. I hope you spot one.

Other sightings this month which are really welcome are of hedgehogs. I've had reports from all over the village and have seen and photographed one myself. It must be many years since we've had so many in the area, and the fact that some have been seen with young, is even more welcome. I can't explain why this has happened but it is really good news that they are making a comeback. Perhaps people have taken on board suggestions made on television and are keeping an eye open, and finding space in their gardens for these delightful, but prickly creatures.

From the History Files.

Canon Lionel Garnett. Rector of Christleton 1868-1911

This year we celebrate the centenary of the death of this great man, who transformed the village as we know it, during his ministry between 1868-1911. He died from small pox contracted whilst working in the village, at his daughter's home in Belfast, in the very week that the Titanic went down. You can imagine that his death was rather insignificant nationally after this tragic event so was rather overlooked in the press of the day.



After 37 years as Rector, Lionel Garnett had been offered the status of Honorary Canon of Chester in August 1906, and a proud parish presented him with an illuminated address, fees and a hood for his MA degree. Mrs Garnett received a silver tea service and bracelet. His departure from the Parish however was rather mysterious. The following extracts come from Parish papers. "In November 1910 the departure of Canon Garnett" within the next few months for reasons that cannot be given" was announced. He wrote in January 1911, 'I have seen 42 New Years Days as Rector of Christleton. I have grown old here and my ways are old. My successor, Reverend G.M.V. Hickey, comes as a young man and will no doubt bring new ways.' He was the first married Rector for more than one hundred years and seemed to regard his parishioners as his extended family. Advice was always forthcoming; whether it was on how to make a good home made drink at 3d a gallon for harvesters. or how to create cheap blankets for the winter. "Paste a few newspapers together to the required size and spread them beneath the quilt" "Paper is a very powerful non conductor of heat, and acts like a very warm blanket. The only objection to the plan is the crackling sound of the paper, but then you must not expect to get everything for a penny or so!"

Always having to raise money for many village schemes, he was frugal with expenses (except in the building of the church) and in 1891 decided to change the evening service in winter to Thursdays at 7.00pm to preserve fuel. "The fire lighted for Thursday evening will warm the church for Friday morning's service" He paid for the excess costs of the magazine himself, and the bound

volumes of the first six years currently in the Cheshire Record Office, are impressive. They contain a great range of religious tracts, articles about everything from equal rights to British birds, poetry and long serial stories with beautiful etchings. In 1881 he had cut down to free sheets of local news only, which were also hand written for a while in 1883, until circulation improved again. He never failed to bring the needs of individuals before the parish in the belief that help would be forthcoming. In March 1904 he wrote "Problem: a labouring man with a wife and family, himself nigh unto death for five months- a child as ill almost as long, Doctor's Bill £8 17s 6d- how is he to pay it? The best solution - a little help. It is a deserving case and I shall be glad to receive contributions.

His stewardship of the village was immense and he was responsible, together with his great supporter, Lucy Anne Ince, for the re building of much of the village, including the Church, both Girls' and Boys' Schools, Christleton Institute and Christleton Grange. He started the Fete and Village Show to raise funds for both the building and running costs of both schools and the re-building of the church. He formed two brass bands to give the young men of the village something to do; he encouraged the bell-ringers; and started Cricket, Rugby and Football clubs. He and his family were involved in all aspects of the village. He gave the Lych Gate in memory of his mother and was responsible for persuading Lucy Anne Ince to erect a Pump House on the Village Green.

His personal interests were in sport. He was a keen Ice Skater and loved cricket, which he described as "one of the oldest and best English games, calculated to do nothing but good" Canon Lionel is listed as a first class cricketer for Middlesex in the MCC Players List, and there is a local legend that he invited WG Grace to come to play in the village. I cannot find evidence for this claim, except that Canon Lionel was a friend of Albert Hornby a famous English Sportsman and Captain of England at Cricket and Rugby, who was also from a large family estate in Lancashire. Hornby did entertain Grace at Nantwich which is only eighteen miles from Christleton and it could have been whilst Grace's team Gloucestershire was on their way to play Lancashire at Old Trafford. Hornby also studied at Oxford. The Rector had been a housemaster at Eton before coming to Christleton and had been in charge of rowing.

In the history of the Parish of Christleton he was a giant: dictatorial and Victorian in every sense, but he was a devout Christian who gave himself honestly and entirely to the service of his parish in changing and difficult times. DC
