# Message from our Rector

There is the story told of Howard Hughes the American billionaire. He was very reclusive and if he ever ventured outside it would be under heavy disguise.

Perhaps on one level, a little over the top, as since he had been a recluse for many years, his appearance had no doubt changed as he grew older, to the extent that he could well have been unrecognisable form his previously published photographs.

However, on one occasion, he is said to have ventured out and a motorist who mistook him for a vagrant, stopped and offered him money to help him on his way.

When the will of Howard Hughes was published after his death, he had left the motorist a substantial sum as a gesture of thanks.

The point of this story, is that most of the time, we perhaps don't realise who we meet or converse with, or even the implications of what we say, for the other person, or even for ourselves.

We can be hard and cold when we feel someone has wronged us, and even unforgiving......and then we turn up at church on a Sunday morning...... whichever church we attend, we may even visit a church other than our own.....because we are angry with someone in our own community.....do we really believe that God doesn't see that.

And we walk up to the Altar rail and place our hands out expecting the forgiveness and new life of Christ to be placed in our hands, whilst our hearts are as hard as stone. The service of Holy Communion from the Book of Common Prayer, and especially the "Invitation to Confession" is one of the most powerful invitations ever,

How many would or could come forward to receive Holy Communion, in any church, if they reflected upon those words.

Can you imagine being invited to a party with many other people, some of whom, you find it difficult to warm to, and some perhaps who you have fallen out with...... and to read on the invitation......**"Only accept this invitation, if you can love everyone else whom I have invited**"

Do you remember the words of Jesus in Matthew 22:36-

40, when he was asked "Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?"

Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is: 'Love your neighbour as yourself."

# THE WAY I SEE IT: My Brother's Keeper?

My sister-in-law was involved in a horrible crash on the A1 in Leicestershire recently. Her car was knocked off the road and ended up among some trees, completely wrecked.

She remembers nothing of the accident, but when she regained consciousness there were two people, total strangers, with her - a man and a woman. They had been in a following car, had witnessed the accident and had pulled over and run to her car to see what they could do.

Her first conscious memory is of the man, who had managed to get into the car beside her, and the woman speaking to her through an open door. Soon the recognised emergency services arrived - two fire engines and a helicopter first of all, and once they had cut her out of the car she was whisked off to hospital. I'm giad to say that she is recovering well.

I tell this true story because the two passers-by didn't. I mean, they didn't 'pass by', like the priest and the Levite in the parable of the Good Samaritan. They stopped and did what they could, and Rosemary was enormously grateful for that touch of human concern and care.

And it happens all the time. An elderly friend of mine slipped while walking his neighbour's dog and fell awkwardly on the pavement. A young woman in a passing car stopped, phoned for the ambulance and stayed with him until it came. Having asked his name, she phoned the hospital that evening to enquire how he was.

Like many people of my generation I've got a bit of a 'nowadays' complex. Things aren't what they used to be

mobile phones on the bus, people not queuing properly, young people's language. But in fact, time and again, one is reminded that we still share a common humanity, that, because we are made 'in the image of God', we are all, in some sense, his children, members of the huge human family.

For that reason, we aren't simply individuals who can be indifferent to others around us. The first violence in the Bible is, of course, the murder of Abel by Cain. In the biblical story, when God asks Cain what has happened to his brother he replies, 'Am I my brother's keeper?'

The answer then is the same as it would be now: yes, you are. We all are. And every single act of compassion, care and ordinary kindness says something about what it means to be truly human...

## Nature Notes.

Continuing the wonderful wildlife month of May, we've had even more excitement in June. The swans walking with their 5 cygnets in tow, through the village, brought great early morning activity to Little Heath Road, on 26th May.



The cygnets were only

six days old, yet the parent birds subjected them to this considerable and hazardous journey to the canal, with or-

deal by traffic, at the prime time for the arrival of children to the Village Schools.

Luckily two ladies from the Square managed to head them off into a garden with a gate, and Beryl & I were called to help. As both injured cob, and exhausted pen were ready to be helped, it didn't take long to catch them and their cygnets and transport them by car (in their own seat belts) down to the canal at Quarry Bridge to the great amusement of many of the Primary School children who saw their release. The latest news as I write these notes is that four of the cygnets survive, one being predated sometime in the first week on the canal.

There were some excellent sightings at Hockenhull, otters again being seen, and in several different locations. We now suspect that there are two pairs, as one pair are always seen together as a pair in the Hockenhull area of the Gowy, and another pair seen with two young further upstream, nearer to Hargrave.

The fact that otters are now regularly seen on the Gowy indicates how clean our rivers now are, and how they have spread to almost every river following the pollution that occurred in many rivers and their persecution by hunting in the past. Amongst the warblers Chiff chaff, whitethroat, lesser whitethroat, blackcap, sedge warbler, grasshopper warbler, reed warbler & reed buntings have probably bred and even the cuckoo has made a belated appearance.

# History File Church Stones.

Anglo Saxon Church; All Saint's Brixworth\*

Following my recent series about the use of stones at St James' I thought I would follow it up with a series about church architecture, and follow its development through the ages.

Having visited early church buildings in Greece, Italy and other parts of Europe you begin to recognise certain styles of architecture and building methods. E.g. The shape of early churches in this country and others are often styled like a roman basilica, with rounded apse, with distinctive arches often made of thin red bricks/tiles in the Roman tradition.

At All Saints at Brixworth near Northampton we see a stone church that meets the middle ground in style between early stone churches in Kent and Northumberland. All Saints' was built in the 8thC at the time of King Offa (757-796) in the region of Mercia.



The period is known as Anglo Saxon, about the same time as the village of Christleton was being developed, although we have no written or visible evidence of a stone church building here at that time. However, our church is set on a hill, and has a circular churchyard or burial ground, in the same fashion as others erected in Saxon times. The church at Brixworth is a really good example of this early style, and was probably built originally as a monastery for a community of monks and first built of wood. The stone building has all the features of a classical Roman basilica, with rounded shaped apse, a triumphal arch dividing the nave and chancel, a triple arch window and many fine arches supporting a line of windows.

These arches made of slatted roman tiles set inexpertly in mortar by Saxon workmen are a unique feature, and provide the best evidence of the Roman building style. They are so distinctive and were probably originally covered in plaster, as happened in so many Roman buildings, best seen perhaps at Pompeii or Herculaneum.

Near the south door there is an Anglo Saxon eagle of St

John' carved on what appears to be a sandstone Roman Cross. The church also has an Anglo Saxon stair turret, one of only four in England. An example of a much smaller church of this period can be found at Cockley Cley in Norfolk. In this case flint is used as the main building material.

# <u>Churches Together in Christleton</u> <u>AGM REPORT 2012/13</u>

The Churches Together in Christleton committee have met 6 times over the last year to discuss and plan services and events. We represent the main denominations in the village and work to promote the Christian faith and build on the unity between us.

In May Chris Platel and Judith Edwards organised the house to house collection for Christian Aid week. A total of  $\pounds 3734$  was raised, including funds from David Cummings' talk and the Methodist Church lunch .

On 9th July we met at Brown Knowl Methodist Church for our Away Day where we pray together, reflect on the past year and discuss new ideas. We then enjoyed lunch prepared for us by Joan Siddorn, with desserts including fruit from her own garden.

In July we funded the 'It's your move' booklets once again which are distributed to every child in Year 6 at our Primary School. Our involvement there continues with our team of five helping Andy Avery lead the Wednesday assembly 'Open the Book' for 4 to 7 year olds, We are amazed every year at the extent the children can remember from the Bible stories, we are aware that some may not hear them from any other source.

The Churches Together Summer teas were served at the Methodist Church from 17th June to September on Sunday afternoons. Having a British participant in the Wimbledon final for the first time in 76 years caused concern that nobody would turn up that Sunday. However, people did call in to buy cakes to enjoy at home whilst watching the match! Cakes were also purchased to eat at cricket matches during the summer. The proceeds this year have benefitted the Red Cross. It was with great sadness that we lost Jayne Roscoe, our treasurer for 10 years, on 16th August, after a short illness. Maybe 'lost' is not the right word, as Peter Lee told us that, straight after Canon Gordon Robinson's death, his widow Dorothy said 'We haven't lost him, we know where he is!' So it is with Jayne, we know she has gone to be with her Lord whom she worshipped and served so wholeheartedly. Our Churches Together meetings are not the same without her humour, kindness and enthusiasm, she will be sadly missed by so many.

On 6th November a coach trip was organised to Shrewsbury. We enjoyed the services of Gerry, a Chester City guide, both on the journey and during our visit to St Chad's Church. We met at the Lion Hotel for a delicious lunch then had some free time before our return home. These enjoyable days out build up the relationships between us and strengthen our resolve to focus on what we have in common rather than dwell on what divides.

We joined together at St James as always for the Remembrance Sunday service on 11th November led by Rev Malcom Cowan. Our village appreciates the opportunity to stand together to ensure those who gave their lives for us are never forgotten.

Leo Carroll, once again, provided the beautiful colour illustration for the Christmas card which is delivered by the Neighbourhood Links to every home in the Parish with details of our Church services. He commented that he had never seen a Christmas card depicting the flight of the Holy family to Egypt, so chose that as his inspiration.

We met on11th December at Birch Heath Lodge nursing home for our carol service for the residents. Our service at Oaklands took place on19th December.

We boarded a coach again on 5th January, this time to visit the Philharmonic Hall in Liverpool to hear the Messiah. Father Paul encouraged us to burst into a rendition of the Hallelujah chorus as we emerged from the Wallasey tunnel. It was, however, in poor contrast to the inspirational and fast-moving performance to which we were treated.

Sunday 6th January saw us gathered in St James to commit the New Year to God in our Covenant and Communion service. Malcolm challenged us with the reminder that Jesus' prayer for his disciples in John 17 was for our unity.

On 10th January we came together at Rowton Methodist Church for a Mass to commemorate the life of Jayne Roscoe. The Church was full, Father Paul echoed all our thoughts as he described Jayne as a wonderful and tireless worker for Churches Together here in Christleton. Several of her friends took the opportunity given to share special memories of her, we will all have our own memories to treasure.

Our Week of Prayer for Christian Unity this year took place between 18th and 25th January as usual. These dates coincided with the worst of the winter weather so numbers attending were down, particularly as the Church car park resembled an ice rink. The prayers were prepared by Christians from India and followed the theme of our pilgrimage, how we walk together and walk humbly with God.

Lent began for us on Ash Wednesday with a service at St Werburgh's where Rev Claire Heald and Rev Malcolm Cowan joined Father Paul Shaw in the imposition of ashes. We met in two housegroups this year with another meeting led by Gwen Knight on Sunday afternoons, about 60 people attended altogether.

On Maundy Thursday we joined together for a United communion service to remember the Last Supper

So, that's a summary of our year. It is an honour to

serve God and our village by the work we do as a united group of Christians.
