The banners and flags which had been proudly displayed, just a few weeks ago, now hang forlorn, the supporters who had saved and planned and travelled to support their team, and sang expectantly before the games, cut a sorry sight as they left the stadia dejected, with hopes and dreams dashed yet again.

Hopes and dreams have been part of the human condition for thousands of years. I pray that those of you who are struggling with finding a way forward with difficult situations, what ever they may be, can have the courage to place the difficulties in God's hands. Let Him guide you to find that feeling of rightness. It might not be a smooth path and it is easy to turn the wrong way but if it is God's way, and he will show you, it will be right.

I always say to God, "If you want me to do it God, you will show me the way."

I am very blessed to serve in such a lovely area, thank you for all your support and kindness. I hope to be out and about on my new super- sprung- for -bumpy- roads bicycle now the weather is trying to be nicer so please wave if you see me. I promise I wont fall off if I wave back!

The History File

WWI Battlefield Sites and Memorials around the town of Ypres, (Ieper).

Recently Beryl & I made the short journey by Eurostar to Bruges & the WWI Battlefield Sites and Memorials around Ypres. (Written as Ieper in Belgium) Nowadays this is a short smooth comfortable journey, compared to the conditions faced by hundreds and thousands of our troops during the Great War of 1914-18.

This area of Belgium was so badly scarred during this time, and there are reminders everywhere of the carnage that took place. Hundreds of thousands of soldiers were killed and many more wounded, and many of the towns, villages and swathes of countryside completely devastated and ruined. It is a tribute to these communities, such as the town of Ypres which has been completely rebuilt since those terrible days. Ypres stands as a monument to the past, and having rebuilt its ancient buildings in a very sympathetic and memorable way, has great hopes for its future as it commemorates the centenary of the Great War.

The Flanders Field Museum set in the magnificently restored 14thC "Cloth Hall" tells horrific stories of those terrible four years, in a very graphic and yet poignant way, making use of new techniques of display, and using the newest of museum technologies. Ypres is surrounded by evidence of the horrors of this war to end all wars with over 140 British & Commonwealth Cemeteries in and around its boundaries. During the war, five million British & Commonwealth Troops passed through Ypres on their way to the front, known as the Ypres Salient, to battlefield sites at Passchendaele(the Valley of Suffering), Polygon Wood, Hill 60, Hill 62 Sanctuary Wood the Messines Ridge etc. All would have passed through the Menin Gate, now

probably the most famous War Memorial for British & Commonwealth Soldiers in the world. It bears the names of 54,896 soldiers reported missing in the Salient during the war, and because there was no more room, a further 35,000 names of the missing are recorded at nearby Tyne Cot Cemetery. Tyne Cot also has 12,000 white Portland memorial stones, set in beautiful ranks, two thirds of which are not named, but are described as a memorial to an unknown soldier of the Great War. The cemetery is set out like a church and contains many areas of beautiful flowers that might be found in a country garden. A few German graves can also be seen in this cemetery, and the beautiful and impressive Cross of Sacrifice stands on top of a concrete German Bunker, which is where it stood on the actual battlefield. Nearby is a large white Stone of Remembrance, which bears the inscription "Their Name Liveth for Evermore" a text chosen from the bible by Rudyard Kipling.



During our stay we located the memorials for four Christleton men. Private George Davenport, Private Walter Handley on the Menin Gate. Trooper Norman Okell on Hill 60 and Serjeant George Richards at Tyne Cot. Over the next few months I will tell you more of the part men and women from our Village Community played in WWI, following research by members of the Local History Group, Christleton High School Staff & Students, Phil Hirst Media Officer at Chester University and myself. One of our greatest finds to date is a bound volume of Christleton Parish Magazines covering the period of the Great War in the County Record Office. This is an amazing treasure trove of stories, and monthly accounts of the progress of the war and life in the Parish and written by the Rector G.M.V.Hickey. I also

hope to bring you some exciting news of our project, to provide a lasting memorial to our War Heroes.

The Menin Gate Ceremony

Every evening at 8.00pm a deeply moving ceremony takes place under the vast arch of the Menin Gate. On 8th May 2014 on the anniversary of the end of WWII, we stood with thousands of others to witness this ceremony under the memorial arch. As the time approached and the traffic stopped, the crowds built up, and we were over ten deep by the time the marching band from the Diksmuide Fire Brigade, accompanied by standard bearers of the British & Belgium Legions, and many old comrades, paraded into their positions under the arch.

A dozen or so representative groups of Armed Forces, of men, women and children from all walks of life and countries, were already lined up ready to lay wreaths at the central memorial steps, at the end of the ceremony. A few words were said by the President of the Menin Gate Association, including the Poem “For the Fallen” by Laurence Binyon, before the group of five buglers played the Last Post. There was complete silence at this point, before the band played the British and Belgium Anthems.



These echoed around this impressive memorial arch, which commemorates so many lives of the fallen, and was followed by the moving ceremony of laying of floral wreaths & tributes, including several by groups of children from

schools in the U.K. remembering former students who had sacrificed their lives during the 1914-18 war. DC

Nature Notes

Last month I was able to report that the elusive cuckoo had been heard in the Parish for the first time for several years. My phone didn't stop ringing for days as several people heard it/them in the area of Plough Lane, Cotton Edmunds, Cotton Abbotts and Hockenhull Platts. I actually saw one flying from the direction of Cheshire View towards Cotton Abbotts Farm to confirm the stories, but of course the call is unmistakable to those who heard it. What was more remarkable is that as we stood in the so called "Trench of Death" at Diksmuide on the Belgium front line running alongside the River Ijzer, and facing the nearest German bunker some 50yards away, we also heard a cuckoo, which called for about a quarter an hour.



We couldn't imagine what the sound would have been like at that point a hundred years ago with the explosive sounds of guns, and cannon fire shooting across the skyline, creating huge craters, and deafening anyone in the vicinity. Yet as we listened to the cuckoo, it was joined by the churring sound of a great reed warbler in a nearby reed bed, and as we tried to locate it, saw a huge grey heron, and several great crested grebes feeding in the river alongside the trench.

As I write reports are coming in from the Parish of very successful breeding of great spotted woodpeckers, great,

blue and long tailed tits, and there are large groups of gold finches flying around. Some birds are even laying second broods already, as there is so much food around after the mild spring and enormous growth of plant life.

Even our old cob can be found with a new spring in his step as he seems to have acquired a new young mate. I'm not sure what an age difference of over twenty years, means in the swan world but he seems extremely happy. I've also had reports of fluffy baby barn owls being seen peeping out of nest boxes, indicating a much better season for this species in 2014.



Damsel and dragonflies have also emerged in great numbers especially along the Gowy, and the colourful blue & black helicopter like “banded agrion damselflies” are a spectacular sight on sunny days. Even the dowdier females look wonderful with their green and gold colour shimmering in the sun. Early orchids have appeared on the wet meadow including several early purple and common spotted varieties. The Dexter cattle seem to be very much at home again on the big meadow and look extremely healthy on their diet of rich green grass. DC

Parkgate Shrimp Boats

On a recent visit to Parkgate and looking out over the river I couldn't help comparing the front as it is now with my early visits as a child .About 1937 I used to go with my parents to visit friends who had Church Farm Burton and who had a son the same age as myself. It was a small dairy farm that no longer exists, the house and building being

converted to dwellings, a large modern school has been built on some of the land. It faced the Church first built in 1086 and rebuilt several times. The tower built in 1721 has a unique clock, having no motion work it only has an hour hand, minutes were not considered important in those far off days.

One day there was a terrible squealing from the butchers across the road, I was told they were killing a pig. The poor pig wasn't going without protest. If it was a fine

afternoon we would all pile into the farmers car and go to Parkgate for an ice-cream, a local farmer named Nicholls made ice cream. There is now a large Ice Cream Parlour next door to the original



shop still called Nicholls but now run by someone else. After the ice cream, if the tide was out, we would climb down the steps in the wall on to the sand. The wall as I remember seemed to be three times higher than it is now but patches of mud were beginning to form. About 50 yards out was a Channel and on high tide shrimp boats would come sailing up and tie-up to the wall, left high and dry when the tide went out The shrimps were sold from two small shops now converted into a takeaway.

There is an interesting association to this, in the centre and slightly set back from the front is St Thomas's Church. It was built in 1843 as a Congregational Chapel taken over by the Presbyterians in 1858 and in 1910 by the Church of England and named St Thomas's it was then known as 'The Fisherman's Church' closed in 1994 it became derelict and was scheduled for demolition, however in 2001 the locals [not just the Anglicans] started a fund raising and with the help of English Heritage the Church was renovated, reconsecrated and is now a Chapel of Ease

for Neston Parish. The full story is told on Wikipedia under St Thomas's Parkgate

Along the front beyond the Boat House Pub was the swimming pool now filled in and used as a car park only the outer wall is left. It was filled by the incoming tide, as were the pools at West Kirby and Hoylake now closed. I wonder what the front will look like in the next 77 years?



THE ROAD TO GENEVA

When my grandson, Antony Foster, was 9 yrs of age he started training in mixed martial arts – a blend of tae kwon-do, kick boxing and karate and joined the Alan Price Martial Arts Academy in Hawarden. He enjoyed the sport from the very beginning throwing himself into training with great enthusiasm & attending training sessions twice weekly. Little did we realise what it would lead to.

Antony achieved black belt status in 2013 and shortly afterwards started competing in tournaments. He was runner-up in his class in the British Championships in 2013 and in April this year he attended the Welsh Championships in Colwyn Bay and this time he won becoming Welsh champion and in so doing he qualified for the World United Martial Arts (Wuma) Championships to be held in Geneva, Switzerland on 11-15 September this year representing Great Britain. At the same tournament Thomas Green aged 9 yrs from Bryn-y-Baal also a member of the Hawarden Academy qualified in his class and he hopes to travel to Geneva at the same time as Antony.



Antony, a pupil at Christleton High School, is actively involved in sport and is working towards his GCSE in PE and hopes to become a PE teacher in the future. He is currently being coached to become an instructor in the martial arts.

Both boys are hoping to add to their trophy and medal collection and are very excited at the prospect of the forthcoming trip to Geneva where they will compete against hundreds of people from more than 60 countries. Antony would love to come away from Geneva with a trophy but what a fantastic experience for him. The trip will cost about £3,000 (one parent has to accompany each boy as they are under age) and to achieve this the Academy and family are busy organising fundraising activities to get the boys there. Christian Ministry and a Prayer of St Francis of Assisi

The inward and spiritual gifts of Baptism are incorporation into Jesus and membership of the Church; seen as the beginning of a person's Christian journey whereby we become members of the Christian community so that we can partake in the life of God and share in the mission of God to the world. Many people are Baptised (christened) as a baby but at Confirmation during youth or later in life you will have 'confirmed' your Baptism and God will have confirmed the activity of the Holy Spirit in you through the words said by Bishop Turner, God has called you by name and made you his own'.

Everyone who is Baptised is called to ministry, often called 'every member or every day ministry', also referred to as Lay Ministry. That is sometimes exercised through authorised and licensed vocations such as a Reader (with a focus on teaching, as well as prayer and worship) or a Pastoral Worker. In other circumstances it may be simply going about daily life wherever that takes place in the community, at work, socially etc where you may minister to others in all sorts of ways small and large, occasional or regular. A particular form of ministry is to be ordained (as a deacon and sometimes subsequently as a priest)

for which the inward and spiritual gift can be said to be setting apart for service, that is called to be a servant.

Whatever the form of ministry and exercise of Christian life, a prayer of St Francis of Assisi seems to express the general essence of it:

“Lord, make me an instrument of your peace
where there is hatred let me sow peace,
where there is injury let me sow pardon,
where there is doubt let me sow faith,
where there is despair let me give hope,
where there is darkness let me give light,
where there is sadness let me give joy,
O Divine Master, grant that I may
not try to be comforted but to comfort,
not try to be understood but to understand,
not try to be loved but to love,
Because it is in giving that we receive,
it is in forgiving that we are forgiven,
and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life”.

The chapel of St Francis sitting below the rather frenetic town of Assisi is calm and beautiful. Whether visiting there and thinking about this prayer in the context of his home area, simply reflecting on these words in your ministry within our community, or reflecting how you may come into such ministry, I hope the prayer provides a helpful thought for each one of us to partake in the life of God, share in the mission of God to the world and to be guided and provide comfort through the love and advocacy of the Presence of Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit.

He was just coming to the end of his office as Mayor. LOCAL HERITAGE LIST



Chester Civic Trust is helping Cheshire West and Chester Council prepare a 'Local List' of heritage assets according to a process devised by English Heritage.

Christleton with Littleton has been selected as one of three pilot areas, alongside Handbridge and Upton.

Heritage assets are defined as:

"Eligible buildings and features that MUST have local architectural, historical or curiosity value, must be permanent rather than temporary or ephemeral, and must NOT be Listed Buildings, Scheduled Ancient Monuments or otherwise included on an existing Statutory register."

Thus nominated heritage assets must be of special local value and need not be buildings.

Participation in the process is welcome from parish councils, residents' associations, local history groups, primary and secondary schools as well as other members of the public who might be interested.

A meeting will be held in the next few weeks to recruit those willing to survey the area and produce a list of nominations for consideration by the Civic Trust. If you would like to help please contact the local coordinator, preferably by e-mail:
