## Message from our Rector

Within the Church of England, each parish is legally obliged to compile an electoral roll. It is the nearest thing to a membership roll that the Church has.

The roll is replaced every six years, and this year is that sixth year. This means that the previous roll is scrapped and a new roll must be prepared, with those eligible having to complete an electoral roll form.

But just what does this mean in practice, I guess that most of us are members, or have been members at one time or another, of a club, or organisation, and the likelihood is, that we will not have simply been a member on paper, but an active member.

What is the point of membership to a club or organisation, unless we attend and "get value for our membership fee".

The present electoral roll (which is due to be scrapped) has over 420 names, each one a member of this parish, and yet our weekly attendance figures across all services number approximately 150 week by week.

The financial contributions and donations which the church receives are received from approximately 150 members.

Many people believe that, as the Church of England is the "state church" it is supported by the state. This is not correct, and each parish must stand on it's own two feet.

 During the 1970's many church notice boards displayed slogans and sound bites, one such slogan was the letters CHCH and underneath it, the words, "what is missing...... UR

Slightly hackneyed perhaps, but it certainly reminded those who read it, and perhaps had completed an application form to be placed on the electoral roll of that parish, that completing a form, indicated a desire to be part of the church, and not just in name, and that they were incomplete without the church, and the church was incomplete without them.

It is truly wonderful to have so many people seeking to be part of the church here in this parish, and as we complete our application forms requesting to be part of the "membership roll" of the church here in the parish of Christleton, may each of us reflect on what that truly means, and may it be a desire to become full and active members, truly serving God and one another in this wonderful place.

#### Nature Notes

January was a very busy month for wildlife in the Parish. Whilst small birds were very active, it was the moles who took centre stage by appearing everywhere despite the frozen ground, and often deep snow. I think that part of the reason for their activity was that the water table is high, and they needed to get away from the problem of water logging in their runs and tunnels. They could be safer nearer the surface. Families of long tailed tits seem to have been seen everywhere, together with great spotted woodpeckers, jays, nuthatches, wrens and robins. Some birds particularly chaffinches and robins, are now singing again, and I guess it won't be long before the blackbirds and thrushes start their early chorus. It can't really be described as the dawn chorus yet, but birds like robins are known to sing from the early hours especially when street lighting is still on.

single fieldfare as

well as the usual blue & great tits, tree & hedge sparrows and a variety of pigeons & doves. The fieldfare was so hungry that it stayed to eat fat rose hips, and ignored my attempts to get a really close up photograph. They are one of the most difficult birds to get close to, so it was a great privilege to get so close to one of these colourful visitors from Scandinavia. The icy cold weather and snow also brought birds of prey closer to the village, and both kestrels and buzzards could be seen coming

into gardens and could often be seen sitting on the top of gate posts or hedgerows. Beryl was almost close enough to touch one as it sat on the hedge opposite the Law College in Pepper Street.

I'm delighted to say that The Pit is now full, and water is running from the overflow into the ditch on Bricky Lane. However there must still be a lot of fish activity at the pit, as grey herons, and the much darker fish - eating cormorants spend most of their days fishing there. The cormorant that seems to have taken up semi permanent residence, and sits on either the swan or fishing platforms, is quite an immature bird judging by its very white underside. It swims very low in the water before diving for food, but stands erect with wings outstretched to dry out its wing feathers, when it has eaten enough. It's almost the same size as the grey heron, but is normally more at home at sea or river estuary, rather than on inland waters. If they find a source of easy food however they will soon adapt, and over the last twenty years or so, cormorants have become a common sight on inland lakes and rivers in Cheshire, and can often be seen flying over the village especially along the canal.

#### CATHIEDRAIL NEWS

Things have been happening at the Cathedral in 2012. Repairs to stained glass windows, decoration of toilet facilities, the Cathedral Big Clean, the re-opening of the Cathedral shop and the removal of the west doors for restoration.

For years Cathedral security and parking have been big problems. However, CCTV cameras have been installed in some key areas including Abbey Square. Over a four night period when 50 incidents were recorded, the CCTV evidence has allowed the Cathedral, along with the Police, to summons 14 people to court. If you wish to volunteer as a Cathedral Constable (background in security not essential) please contact the Constables Department at 12 Abbey Square.

The automatic bollards, installed in the autumn, have been a great success and there are now 20 additional spaces that used to be filled with fly parking.

The sound system has been improved and new microphones installed. The Song School debt has been cleared thanks to an anonymous donation.

Free entry has been tested during December and January and in December Cheshire West and Chester Council made a grant offer to the Cathedral which will fully fund the complete opening of the Cathedral Tower to the public later this year as a new attraction for the City of Chester. This should support plans for the main Cathedral to become free to enter.

The Chester Mystery Plays, held every five years, are to be staged for the first time ever inside the Cathedral itself from 26 June – 13 July. Tickets from the Cathedral Box Office on 01244-500959 or www.chestercathedral.com

The History File Sightings of The Aurora Borealis.

Henry Prescott was Diocesan Treasurer at Chester Cathedral in the 17thC and wrote regularly in his famous diary about his visits to Christleton to see his friend Robert Townsend the Recorder of Chester, who lived at The Old Hall. I have transcribed his diary writings as they apply to Christleton, and apart from all the local small talk and happenings at the Old Glass House Inn, there are also very interesting entries relating to the weather and associated phenomenon. He writes; March 11th 1716.

"A sharp but kindly day. Accounts describe a phenomenon in the sky from 8 o'clock until 3 in the morning. Tis called the Aurora Borealis, a light or moisture sometimes dilated, sometimes embodyed into columns sometimes broken and divided into figures ands strands". June 9th 1718.

"The weather continues disposed to rain. Here the clouds pregnant and dark are broke with long valleys of thunder, a most memorable clap which in the midst of common thunder distinguishes itself and makes all things tremble. The clouds again are ralleyed, and fill the horizon with gloomy terror, the lighting and thunder complete the scene above the shocks of human imitation. Seas break down on

these parts and turn the roads into lakes and the streets to rivers".

March 29th 1719.

"A meteor appears in the sky".

Although Christleton always seems to avoid the excesses of our British weather, we do get the occasional glimpse of something extraordinary as



described above. Canon Lionel Garnett also writes about seeing the Aurora in the sky above the village in 1907. He records in the Parish

#### Magazine;

"We don't often see the Aurora Borealis here, but on Saturday evening 9th February there was a noticeable display. The sky was aflame with great streamers of flickering light; a sight lucky enough to be seen by all who were lucky enough to see it."

It was also observed by a family from the village at the end of 2012, so when the weather conditions in early January were forecast to produce possible sightings in our area, I was on the look out each night. Sadly I failed to spot any sign of it despite constant studying of the night sky. In 1959 I had been lucky enough to spend weeks studying the aurora in Arctic Sweden, and it is the most amazing sight to see. Just recently I received an e mail from Alane a friend in Canada, who I've got to know through researching her Christleton family history, which contained some wonderful pictures of the aurora in Northern Canada which she has allowed me to share.

Not everyone has access to the internet to read this magazine, but please be aware that if you are able to, you can see the magazine in full colour, by going onto the church website www.christleton.org.uk and then click on Parish Magazine. You will be thrilled with the way it is presented. Richard Nicholson has done a wonderful job with the website over the years, and there is so much to enjoy on that site. We try to keep it up to date with church and village activities, and almost every event that takes place is recorded there. DC.
