The Rector's Letter

Dear Friends

DANCING ON ICE

'Dancing on Ice' has become a very popular series on Television as celebrities from different arenas of sport and entertainment master progressively difficult skills on ice till one is crowned Champion. It must be very daunting at the start for those with little or no experience of skating – how on earth do you keep upright on ice on such narrow blades, let alone master the necessary skills for the more complicated 'lifts' and manoeuvres? Of course they have to start with the basics, and they each have an expert partner to teach them and show them what to do. Each week Torvill and Dean explain and enthuse about the progress competitors have made. Eventually the likes of Kyran Bracken become experts in their own right and it becomes part of their life. We may not manage that, but I am sure we can all at least remember the painful process of learning to ride a bicycle until it became second nature.

The Disciples of Jesus went through a similar process. While Jesus was with them they chose to give up all to follow him. He patiently showed and taught them the basics of the Kingdom of God, and gave them his example to follow. This was not just for amusement or entertainment, but for the fundamentals of life in God's world. Like all the best teachers, Jesus knew he must draw back, and let his Disciples find out for themselves. In one final, once for all demonstration of his love, he died for them on the Cross. At first they were devastated by their loss, but gradually it dawned on them that he was with them in a new way, giving new life and hope. Now, as we celebrate on Thursday 17 May, he ascended to God's right hand on high to confirm his life as the perfection of creation and as the standard and example for all to follow. Then, once Jesus had ascended to heaven, he sent the Disciples the gift of the Holy Spirit to empower and enable them to lead the lives he had shown them so that it became second nature to them. So, on Sunday 27 May, we celebrate Whitsunday.

Significantly Ascension Day this year falls in Christian Aid Week (13 – 19 May). Christian Aid is no optional extra, but a basic first step in the teaching of our Ascended Lord. In his life Jesus went about healing the sick, feeding the hungry and caring for the needy. He washed his Disciples' feet and said: "I have come not to be served, but to serve, and give my life as a ransom for many." He also taught that whatever we do to help the sick or hungry or those in need, we do for him; and whenever we turn our back on them, we turn our back on him. But even more than this, Jesus taught and lived in harmony with the whole of creation. He always used nature to teach us the

deepest truths about the Kingdom of God, and taught that we shall be held responsible for our stewardship of God's earth.

As we look around the world today 'dancing on ice' takes on a different and alarming meaning. As we see the devastation of war and oppression; of terrorism and exploitation; of hunger and homelessness, we cannot but be dismayed and ashamed. As we hear of the threat of global warming, pollution and the wholesale 'devouring' of the world's natural resources with no thought for future generations, we can surely see that we are literally 'dancing on thin ice', and that catastrophe will be the inevitable outcome. This is not a threat of God imposing punishment so much as the inevitable consequence of failing to heed the basic rules for living in God's world. We are stewards, not owners, of life in this world, and we ignore the maker's instructions at our own peril.

Can we use this May to turn again to Jesus our Ascended Lord as our teacher to help us learn again the basics of God's Kingdom? Can we so try to live in harmony with God and his wonderful world that gradually, and step by step, it becomes part of us, until through prayer and waiting, we receive the gift of the Spirit to send us out to live and work to his praise and his glory.

This month's cover picture shows the scene outside Thomas Johnson's Post Office on the corner of Pepper Street and Windmill Lane. This shop sold bread made in the bakery at the rear, and was also licensed to sell flour and beer. The shop competed for sales of bread in the village with Thomas Butler and family from another bakery at Christleton Mill on Whitchurch Road. However the most extraordinary thing I've heard about the old Post Office in the picture, was that there were 16 collections & deliveries of mail a day. Today in our modern era, with all the transport infrastructure that exists, we have one delivery and collection a day! Thomas Johnson was a great supporter of the village and village events, and it's said that when the boiler at the Old School broke down one fete day, he boiled all the water for afternoon teas in his house, and the kettles were hurriedly taken across to the hall for teas to be served by Sam Earlam Headmaster and his team.

The figures in the picture show Thomas and his wife Elizabeth on the right, and William & Sarah Morgan on the left, (Reg Morgan's parents). Notice the false window painted on buildings to avoid paying a "lights tax", and to the right above the doorway is an old gas lamp. The windows are also all capable of being shuttered, presumably for security. This is a very rare occurrence. The cobbled street and pavement are also evident, as is the block of sandstone to prevent horse drawn carts hitting the end wall when turning the corner from the bakery. The house was demolished sometime in the late 1890's and replaced by a new building built of shiny red Ruabon brick, which was used for many buildings in the village around that date, including the old boy's school now the Parish Hall.

Saints' Windows in the Cloisters

St Alphege, was born about 953, and was successively a monk of Deerhurst (Glocs), a hermit in Somerset, Abbot of Bath and, in 984, bishop of Winchester in succession to St. Ethelwold. He was used as an emissary to placate the Danish invaders who came to London and Wessex in 994, converted their leader to Christianity, and persuaded them to withdraw. In 1005 he became Archbishop of Canterbury. Another Danish force now overran southern England (1011) and the king, the famously named Ethelred the Unready, was unable to cope with them, despite the payment of the tribute tax known as the Danegeld. They besieged Canterbury and took Alphege hostage, demanding an enormous ransom which the Archbishop refused to allow the people to pay. Finally, in 1012, after a drunken feast, the Danes had Alphege axed to death at Greenwich. Under King Canute, he was enshrined at Canterbury in 1023. Later, the Norman archbishop Lanfranc suspended the celebration, questioning whether Alphege was actually a martyr for the faith. The answer, supplied by St Anselm, was that like St John the Baptist, Alphege was a martyr for justice and truth; the feast was then duly restored. By an

May 2007

act of prescience, St Thomas Becket, in his last sermon at Canterbury before his murder, praised Alphege as the first Canterbury martyr.

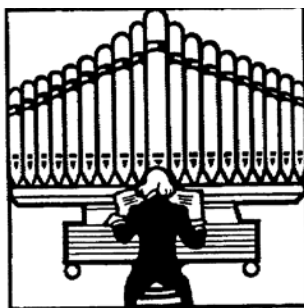

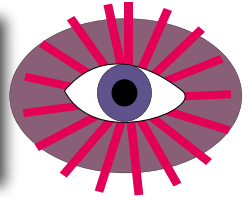

Nature Notes



The warm weather of the last few weeks has seen the extraordinary flight of dozens of butterflies, all much earlier than usual. Peacock, red admiral, tortoiseshell, and comma's are on the wing. All these species have emerged from their winter hibernation as fully grown butterflies. However this week I have seen newly emerged small and large white butterflies, together with the pretty orange tip butterfly, that times its arrival to coincide with the first growth of the lady smock, also known as the May or cuckoo flower. The first chiff chaff was heard on the 13th March at The Pit, and there are several singing at sites all around the village and city. I saw a very early house martin on the 15th and the first three swallows on the 4th April. Male blackcaps arrived in the village from Africa on Easter day, preparing the way for their females who will come two weeks or so later. The buzzards around the village are displaying vigorously, and residents in a Littleton house had the sight of a pair arriving and mating in their garden, disturbing all other birds, and then promptly took up residence in nearby woodland.

May 2007

The swans at the Pit are already in the final stages of nesting, with the cygnets due to emerge in the first week or so in May. However I can see trouble ahead, as there is now another pair of swans nesting on the canal in Christleton, and yet a third pair in "The Pit swans" territory at Waverton, nesting in a canal side garden. Both pairs have connections with the Pit, as the Waverton pair, were "seen off" in February, and one of the swans on the canal near Quarry Bridge is a Christleton cygnet from some years ago. The swans around the city are doing well this year, with eleven active nest sites for me to look after, and the pair near "The Shady Oak" at Tiverton have ten eggs in their nest.!

Our April Walking Group visit to Marbury Park & Budworth Mere was highly successful, as both a walk in beautiful countryside among the spring flowers, and for the sightings of birds. Our morning list included, buzzard, kestrel, sparrowhawk, mute swan, great spotted woodpecker, chiff chaff, dunnock. Great tit, blue tit, long tailed and coal tit, greenfinch, goldfinch bullfinch and



chaffinch. Coot, moorhen, great crested grebe, little grebe, kingfishers (2) water rail, tufted duck, garganey, teal, Canada goose, grey lag goose, mallard, wigeon, shoveller, heron, reed bunting, black headed gull, mistlethrush, songthrush, blackbird, wren, robin and treecreeper. Marbury Park is an excellent place to see birds.

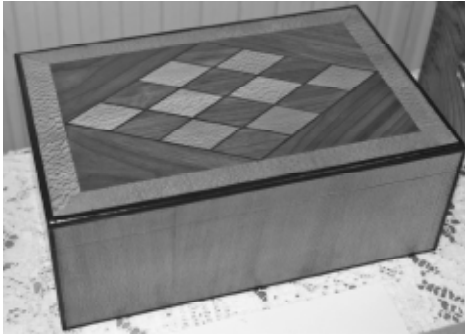

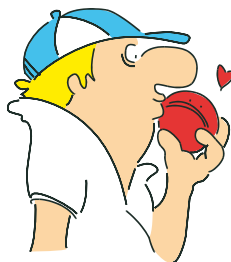
