The Rector's Letter

Dear Friends

Prayer of the Month

Each month in this magazine I include a 'Prayer of the Month' to go 'alongside' the Rector's Letter. This month I include, in my letter, a prayer sent to my sister by a friend in America. Minister Joe Wright was asked to pray at the opening session of the senate in Kansas and instead of the usual generalities he offered this:-

"Heavenly Father, we come before you today to ask forgiveness and to seek your direction and guidance. We know your word says 'woe unto those who call evil good and good evil' but that is exactly what we have done. We have lost our spiritual equilibrium and reversed our values.

We confess that we have ridiculed the absolute truth of your word, and called it pluralism. We have exploited the poor and called it the lottery. We have rewarded laziness and called it welfare. We have killed the unborn and called it choice: we have shot abortionists and called it justifiable. We have neglected to discipline our children and called it building self esteem. We have abused power and called it politics.

We have coveted our neighbours possessions and called it ambition. We have polluted the air with profanity and pornography and called it freedom of expression. We have ridiculed the time honoured values of our forefathers and called it enlightenment.

Search us, O God, and know our hearts today. Cleanse us of every sin and set us free. Guide and bless these men and women, who have been sent to us to direct us to the centre of your will; we openly ask these things in the name of your Son, Jesus Christ, the living Saviour. Amen."

You may not agree with every sentiment expressed in that prayer, and some of them could be given very unchristian interpretation if, for example, it were taken to imply that all welfare recipients are lazy. As a whole, however, that prayer challenges popular 'secular' thinking in our society, which assumes the moral high ground. This 'high ground' is built on the assumption that freedom of choice and expression is everyone's right, and that there are no moral absolutes. Yet that assumption is shattered on the rocks of human frailty (or what the Bible calls our fallen nature). We obviously do not want freedom of choice or expression in extreme cases such as sexual abuse or racism, but that also extends to 'social' issues such as 'the neighbour from hell', noise pollution or vandalism. How do we decide what is right and what is wrong? Like it or not, decisions have to be made on value judgements, and judgements need standards and criteria against which they can be measured. Ultimately those standards will be shown to be arbitrary, transitory and biased if they are fixed by human decision, even if by the will of the majority.

We need to rediscover the spiritual dimension to life, and measure all decisions and behaviour against the absolute truth of God, as our moral imperative. Whether, or not, you agree with all the sentiments expressed in Joe Wright's prayer, may I invite us all to make our own 'Prayer of the Month' and rediscover our spiritual values. Have we been taking the ethical standards of our Christian background and heritage too much for granted? Are we free-wheeling on the memory of a faith and worship which once were ours, but is slowing to a standstill? Can we afford to relegate worship and faith to an occasional interlude, when other priorities and attractions allow? How can we re-invigorate the spiritual energy of our life and re-connect to our sense of God's presence so we feel in harmony with his purposes for creation? What challenges us in our society, and in our own life choices, that leads us to desire and seek God's purpose through our prayer? How can we as a Church help people to make this connection, not only as individuals but together, so we regain a sense of privilege and purpose as God's people?

The Gardening Club was re started 5 years ago following an initial meeting of interested people. It quickly became an established Club in the village with a regular turnout of 30-40 members. THE VISIT

"Our church used to be very okay. We did all the things churches do just about as well as they could be done, and we talked about our founder with much reverence and proper gratitude. We said how much we would have liked to meet him when he was around and how much we looked forward to seeing him at some remote time in the future.

The unexpected news that he was going to pay us an extended visit now, in the present, was to say the least, very disturbing. Confident statements about 'the faith' tended to dry up. People who usually seemed reasonably cheerful looked rather worried. Many of those who had been troubled appeared to brighten considerably.

A man who always said that 'atonement was a peculiarly Jewish idea' became extremely thoughtful. Someone who had published a pamphlet entitled 'The Real Meaning of the Resurrection Myth' joined the mid-week prayer group and developed an open mind. Desperate folk just counted the days.

Each of us, I suppose, reacted to the news in our own way, but I think the thing we had in common was feeling that the game (albeit a very sincere and meaningful game for some) was over. No more pretending when he came. He would know."

Nature Notes

At the beginning of the month I had the opportunity to stay and walk in the beautiful Grazalema National Park in Andalucia, Southern Spain. It was a wonderful opportunity to explore a new area, staying in a medieval village with its distinctive "white houses", walking through magnificent limestone scenery over 1000m high, and learning about its unique wildlife. On opening the window of my room I could usually hear nightingales singing in the valley below, together with cetti's warblers, blackcaps, corn buntings, hoopoe's, golden orioles and colourful chattering bee eaters.

A look skywards would usually result in seeing griffon or black vultures, booted or short toed eagles, but sadly not golden eagles or lammergeier's which are also said to be in the Park.

Although I had gone on a walking holiday, I couldn't resist spending time photographing the wild flowers, and I ended up with a collection of photographs of sixteen species of orchids, almost all new to me, and three which were so rare that they were new to my local guide. My favourites were both single specimens, a 10

man orchid 75cm tall where each of the hundred or so tiny flowers on the stalk looks like a little man. and a beautiful blue, atlas orchid, one of the bee orchid family. Another highlight was to see a meadow full of tall purple iris, which also contained thousands of even deeper coloured purple marsh orchids. On the same walk there were some large and very beautiful mountain peony's, deep crimson and yellow in colour. Whilst walking up on the highest limestone ridges we were also very lucky to see a good number of the rare mountain goats, the ibex.

The only downside was the weather. Spring has been very cold and wet over most of Europe including Spain, and that week was no exception, as we walked under stormy skies, and often faced torrential rain, including large hailstones, thunder and lightning. Several times we had to take shelter in derelict houses and mills, one of which memorably had several large bats flying around, even in the middle of the day.

Stop Press Christleton Swans

I have to report very sad news in that today 11th June, I was called to Rowan Park to find two of our cygnets dead, and the other only just alive. Beryl & I spent an hour with blankets and hair drier trying to dry out its waterlogged feathers and body, muscle was frequently flopping onto its back. The cause of the problem is not known as all three cygnets were in good condition and growing fast when I saw them yesterday. The RSPCA will carry out an autopsy in case there is a local problem, as two of the four cygnets from outside the Great Mills Store in Boughton also died



and as the cygnet began to show some signs of life, and seemed to gain a little strength, we took it over to the RSPCA Centre in Nantwich. However when we left the centre the signs weren't good, as it was displaying signs of lead poisoning, as the neck, its major July, 2004 www.christ suddenly a few days ago. There is just a possibility that it may be a bigger problem than we are aware of, because I understand that vets in several areas of the country have described seeing a number of seemingly healthy animals and birds dying suddenly with a convulsive illness. It just might be that this is being caused by some kind of lead poisoning. I will keep in touch with Stapeley Grange and hopefully monitor our own cygnet's progress. It clearly is a fighter, so we can only hope for the best.

All had looked so different just three weeks ago when the family had walked through the village. Although it's a shame that they don't stay on the pit, more people have a chance to see them on the canal. They walked through the village to the Ring O Bells car park as usual, but by the time I got there, they had walked back towards the Village Green, and because they were a little later than usual, we had the problems of the busy school traffic to contend with. The best way of taking them to safety was to carry them, and with the help of the Rector and Sue Rees, we carried the family through the traffic in Village Road, along the Stile Footpath to the canal at Rowan Park, much to the delight of the people who saw our little procession. They remained there safely, moving easily each day between Christleton and Waverton, and growing fast until this morning's incident. I hope

that we can find out what has caused the problem and prevent it happening again. The cob and pen were looking slightly oiled when I left them, but I felt that the cygnet had to be dealt with first. I'm sure that they could sense something was wrong, because they were quite happy for me to handle the cygnets.

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Christian concern as Civil Partnership Bill has second reading in House of Lords

Following the recent second reading of the Civil Partnership Bill in the House of Lords, the Evangelical Alliance has continued to reject suggestions that there can be moral or legal equivalence between marriage and same-sex partnerships. The Evangelical Alliance opposes the Government's approach to legislating for samesex relationships.

Don Horrocks for the Evangelical Alliance explains: "The word 'marriage' is effectively being hijacked, even though the Government claims these proposals do not amount to samesex 'marriage'. However, this will clearly be the result, as the Bill will appropriate virtually the same rights as married couples. The very text of the Bill itself largely mimics matrimonial law."

He continues: "Most Christians would accept that there are legitimate issues of basic human justice to be considered for samesex couples. However, marriage unequivocally a is unique institution involving the life-long, exclusive union of one man and one woman. Christians highlight the importance of the creation of human beings as male or female in the image of God and emphasise the complementarity of husband and wife.

"We continue to believe it would have been preferable to deal with any perceived human rights injustices by amending existing law, rather than introducing a nationwide ideologically conceived Bill. We think marriage will certainly be further undermined by this Bill." The Bill, which has now gone to



Grand Committee for detailed scrutiny is expected to proceed through both houses of parliament for at least the remainder of the parliamentary session.

The Passion brings the highest response ever to Christian Enquiry Agency

Over two thousand people who have seen 'The Passion of the Christ' film have sent response postcards to Christian Enguiry Agency (CEA) asking about Jesus Christ, and more are arriving every day. "We've never known anything like this, and had to pull out all the stops to cope with the demand for information about Jesus. We've been totally overstretched, but it is great to be helping so many people," said Andrew Taylor at the CEA Enquiry Office. Around 150,000 response postcards were placed in cinemas across Britain in an ambitious outreach campaign to reach people who don't attend church. Churches have snapped up thousands more of the cards for outreach. Those who send the enquiry card back to CEA receive a free copy of the†'True or False' booklet produced by CPO, which relates to the film, plus a personal

letter offering further help and ideas. These include a free copy of one of the gospels in a magazine format, details of local Alpha courses, a telephone helpline, prayer and contact with a local Christian. Hundreds of people are now coming back with questions and requests for help.Commenting on the campaign, Jeff Bonser, the CEA Director, said "We felt it was vital to provide an opportunity for people to find out more about Jesus while they were still in the cinema and thinking about what they had experienced."Cinema is the most popular form of cultural activity outside the home, attracting over 80% of the entire population in one year and more than 60% of all cinemagoers are under 35. This is the age group that is missing from churches and the film offered a great opportunity to reach them with the reality of the cost of God's love for us all."The response postcard also refers enquirers to the evangelistic website, www.rejesus.co.uk/thepassion. The website has background notes to moments from the film, covering the Last Supper, King Herod, the shadowy 'devil' figure, and other details - plus a special page on 'what happened next'. These pages have received thousands of hits.
