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# Benthams' Bulletin - End Of August 2001

I'm starting to write this at 8.00 pm on 28th August. The date and time are quite significant because a year ago, to the nearest half hour, we were boarding a jumbo jet at Gatwick Airport on the way out to Zimbabwe. We had been alarmed by violence leading up to the General Election (31 people had died), but had been consistently reassured that most of the country was quiet and that we would be safe. Those reassurances have proved to be true.

So we've been in Zimbabwe a year and in Chipinge for nine months of this time. The country is far, far worse off, more unstable, unpredictable, isolated and violent than when we arrived. The people, white and black, are facing a very uncertain future. Food shortages loom, and we all have the prospect of living through very turbulent times. Chipinge itself is quiet, but no-one knows for how long, and we exist with the possibility that we could be given 72 hours to get out, or worse.

Just recently, as things have got much worse very quickly and Zimbabwe has appeared often in the news, for all the wrong reasons, we have been tremendously encouraged by the number of e-mails and letters which have said, "We watch the news, we are worried about you, we are praying for you." The simple fact of people assuring us that they are praying means the world to us. We are so grateful. Please do continue to pray for us and for Crosslinks.

In the next month or so there will be a lot of activity in Chipinge, as we embark properly on the training of new subdeacons, prepare dozens for baptism, press on with fundraising and Alpha. Also we have to set up a monthly communion service at New Year's Gift and make some decisions about the best kind of ministry/pastoral care for Middle Sabi. We are also both involved in Theological Education by Extension for two days.

### Photo of the Month



This is a picture of "The Grange" in Village Road as it appeared before 1868, when it was rebuilt as a Rectory for Rector Canon Lionel Garnett. The picture is an artistic print but has been recorded as a photograph, which would make it a very early one as far as the village is concerned, as photography would have been in its infancy at that date. The earliest photograph we have previously, is a picture taken in the old John Sellers Charity School in the early 1870s. I have also been given another photograph of the "1737" church building in exactly the same style as this photograph, so it could be genuine. This was kindly donated by the late Mrs Priddey of Castle Cottage, Littleton. The new "Grange" was built in the style of many church houses at that time by the Liverpool Diocese. Jean Pryce Parry, whom many of you will remember, once told me that she and her husband, the Reverend Fred Pryce Parry, used to live in an identical house which was the Rectory for the Minister of Sefton Church on Merseyside. If you look up at the balcony on the south side of the present house you will see in inscription "Nisi Dominus" (Bless this house) and a shield with the letters L and G inter-twined, representing Lionel Garnett. The photograph is in an oak frame, which has inscribed on the reverse, "That the oak for this frame comes from timber from a panel in the old house". It was written by the young man who lived there before the arrival of the new Rector, H Rice Wiggins, and countersigned by Mr E Wardell - Yarborough. I will try to find out more about these families and report back in a future magazine. This photograph was previously published in a pamphlet about Village History written by Rector A.A.Guest Williams in 1953, which raised money for the then new King George VI playing fields behind Little Heath Pit. #### A "Thank You" from Ladakh

We have just received a thank you letter from Bilques Giri and her husband Nasir in Kargil Village Ladakh, for the donation of £500 from the Village Millennium Funds towards a literacy project for orphaned children. As you will be aware there has been great turnoil in the dispute and conflict between India and Pakistan, and we wanted to ensure that the money got to the people concerned and not to a government or semi-official agency who might siphon off the money. So the money was delivered personally by Dr Mussa, an uncle of Bilques who has been studying in England, and who recently travelled back home to Kashmir for a holiday. Bilques was the oldest of the five colourful Ladhaki girls who spent three to four months in the village in 1987 with Gertrude Wright. She now lives in Kargil a very poor district with her husband and their child Mehvish, who is now two years old. They are in charge of this project to provide education for 20 children in this very remote region of the world, and we hope that this gift from Christleton will go a small way to help them in their task.

#### Recent News from Ian and Claire Gray and the Tampulma Community in Ghana

The recording of the Jesus film in the Tampulma language is taking place this month (August). Samuel Asare, the Old Testament translator, has been chosen to be the narrator, and Pastor Joseph is reading the part of Jesus. We would like to thank the King's Chorale choir in Northern Ireland, and Christleton Parish in England for helping us purchase the necessary equipment to show this film when it is finished: a TV, a video recorder and a portable generator. Please pray that this film will be a great tool of evangelism in reaching the Tampulmas in a language they can understand – their own.

# Judges' Comments about Christleton

Christleton is a village that obviously has a very active community and it was a joy to visit the village. On all visits the village was clean and tidy without any evidence of rubbish or litter. There is evidence of conservation activity and it was very interesting to read about "Christleton Pit". The area is a credit to the village. There were a number of very nice hanging baskets in the village. Both public houses were clean and tidy. The Ring O' Bells' hanging baskets added colour to the area. While the British Legion is not included in judging it is to be hoped that a new owner will be found soon to improve this area. The play area was particularly nicely kept.

Overall marks obtained totalled 84%.

# For those born before 1940

We were born before television, before pencillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, plastic, contact lenses, Frisbees and the Pill. We were born before RADAR, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ballpoint pens. Before dishwashers, tumble dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip dry clothes and before men walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together. (How quaint can you be?)

We thought fast food was what you ate in Lent, a big Mac was an over-sized raincoat and crumpet was what we had for tea. We existed before house husbands, computer dating, dual careers and when a "meaningful relationship" meant getting along with cousins, and sheltered accommodation was where you waited for a bus. We were born before day-care centres, group homes and disposable nappies. We never heard of FM radio, tape decks, word processors, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, yoghurt and young men wearing earrings (pace Sir Francis Drake). For us 'time sharing' meant togetherness. A 'chip' was a potato, 'hardware' meant nuts and bolts, and 'software' was not a word.

Before 1940 Japan meant junk, the term 'making out' referred to how you did in your exams. 'Stud' was something you used to fasten a collar to a shirt and 'going all the way' was staying on the bus to the depot.

Pizzas, MacDonalds and instant coffee were unheard of, In our day smoking was fashionable, grass was mown, coke was kept in the coal place and a joint was a piece of meat you had on Sundays and pot was something you cooked in. Rock music was a grandmother's lullaby, Eldorado was an ice-cream and a gay person was the life and soul of the party and nothing more. While aids just meant beauty treatments – or help for someone in trouble.

We who were born before 1940 must be a hardy bunch when you think of the ways in which this world has changed and the adjustments we have had to make. No wonder we are so confused and that there is a generation gap today. But – by the grace of God – we have survived! Alleluia!

# 1st Christleton Scout Group

September was a special month for the 1st Christleton Scout Group when they celebrated their 80th birthday. The group was formed and registered at the London Scout HQ on 30th September 1921 and the first Leader was Fred Taylor, who lived in Littleton. Unlike many other Scout groups, they have continued for the past 80 years without ever closing and having to be reformed. Boys from Christleton became Scouts before the Group was formed by joining the 2nd Chester Troop, which met in Boughton, and 18 served with the forces during World War I. The Cub Pack was formed in July 1925 by Mrs Tarbuck, the wife of the Group Scoutmaster (GSM) and, like the Scouts, they met in the Old Girls' School. During the last 80 years there have been only seven GSMs or Scouters i/c; the current was is Mr Keith Harding. During World War II, the Group had a strong Cub Pack led by Miss Smith, after whom Skip's Lane was named, but the Scout Troop only managed to stay active by being run by two soldiers serving in the RAMC who were stationed at Saighton Camp.

The Group has achieved a number of "firsts" in the Chester District. It was the first to build its own HQ. The land was given to the Group by the Squire, Mr Townsend-Currie, who was also ADC, and the necessary money to build the hut was raised in the village by the usual hard work of organising dances, whist drives, jumble sales and public subscriptions – and all in the days when the village was far smaller. The original hut is still being used by 1st Kelsall. The original wooden building was replaced by one built in brick and was opened by Lord Rochester in 1963. Another "first" for Christleton. 1st Christleton was the first group in the District to be inspected by Baden-Powell when he stayed at The Old Hall, and the boys formed a Guard of Honour up the drive in May 1928. The following day, B-P inspected the new HQ before going to Eaton Hall.

In 1952, Senior Scout Ken Walley was the first in the District to be awarded the Queen's Scout Badge.

Over the years, the Group has maintained a very high standard of Scouting. There have been 18 Queen's Scouts (I have no record of King's Scouts, but I am sure that there were some), and boys from the Group have represented Cheshire at nine World Jamborees. Roy Fisher

In this respect the Chester and Kelsall branches of the RNLI say a big thank you to friends and supporters who helped to make the musical evening on 21st September a worthwhile event, which raised £900 to keep the work of the RNLI and its voluntary crews available all the year round.
